Boston, Mass., December 26—Two thousand men, women and children are homeless and being cared for in theaters and public halls and two score are reported as missing, as the result of the inundation of a section of the city of Chelsea, Mass., half a mile square in the district which was devastated by the great conflagration of not quite two years ago.

The terrific hurricane which has raged along the New England coast during the past 20 hours, littering it with wrecks, was responsible for the second Chelsea disaster of the decade. To night Chelsea is in total darkness.
