In case a part of any tract of land (except town lots) shall be sold, the quantity sold will be laid off in a square form, or as nearly so as practicable, at the most northwesterly corner of the tract from which the sale is made; and if the sale be made from any in-lot or out-lot in any town, or from any particular part thereof, the quantity sold will be so laid off as to extend from the principal street, road or alley which may be the most convenient front to such lot, to the rear of the lot, and to be bounded by lines as nearly parallel with the out-lines of such lot as practicable.
