

REDEMPTION OF THE PUBLIC DEBT.—With a view of reducing the public debt, the Secretary of the U. S. Treasury has just issued the following notice, which if it bring forward the stocks to the amount indicated, may affect the money market to some extent favorably:

Treasury Department, July 30, 1853. Notice is hereby given to the holders of the six per cent. stocks of the United States, of loan authorized by the act of 29th January, 1847, and redeemable the 31st of December, 1867, and of the loan authorized by the act of 31st March, 1848, and redeemable 30th June, 1866, that this department is prepared to purchase, at any time between the date thereof and the 1st day of December next, to the extent of the sum of five millions of dollars of the said stock, in the manner and on the terms hereinafter mentioned, to-wit:

In case of any contingent competition, within the amount stated, preference will be given in the order of time in which the said stocks may be offered. The certificates, duly assigned to the United States, must be transmitted to this department; upon the receipt whereof, a price will be paid, compounded of the following particulars:

1. The par value or amount specified in each certificate.
2. A premium on said amount of twenty-one per cent.
3. Interest on the par of the certificate from the 1st of July, 1853, to the date of receipt and settlement at the Treasury, with the allowance (for the money to reach the owner) of one day's interest in addition.

Payments for said stocks will be made in drafts of the Treasury of the United States, on the assistant treasurer at Boston, New York or Philadelphia, as parties may indicate.

A desperate encounter took place at Boston on Friday night, between the harbor police and two river thieves, who had been boarding and robbing vessels, disguised in masks and sometimes using chloroform. The robbers were seen leaving a vessel in a boat, and were pursued and captured. They afterwards escaped and were again pursued, the robbers firing five times at the officers, who returned the compliment, but without effect on either side. One of the robbers was finally struck down by a watchman, and the other was run down. They were armed with two six barreled revolvers each, and several gold watches, which they had stolen, were found upon them. A third number of the gang was arrested on Saturday. Their names are George Taylor, alias Kelly, William McLaughlin, and Henry Kelly, alias Allen.—Upon them was found a large amount stolen from the brig Maria Wilder, boarded July 26th. The captain was put to sleep with chloroform and his pantaloons robbed of \$375.

PETRIFFED MAN.—The "Morristown (Ill.) Yeoman" states that not long since, while some men were digging in a coal bank near the canal, they exhumed a body of a man in a perfect state of petrification. From the corduroy cloth in which the legs were encased, the cords and seams of which are perfectly defined, it is supposed to be the body of one of the laborers engaged in the construction of the canal. The limbs are nearly perfect, and are completely transformed to stone.

FATAL ACCIDENT.—It becomes our painful duty this morning to record a sad accident that happened an estimable citizen of the town of Jackson, by the name of Mr. Hatten, at the Grocery store of Benjamin Barklow on Second street in this city. Mr. Wm. Furguson, of this city, had in his hand a Revolver which accidentally went off, the ball entering just below the right eye, killing him instantly.

It was purely an accident and goes to show the great importance of being exceedingly careful when handling such deadly weapons. By this sad casualty, his family and the community in which he lived, have been deprived of a kind friend—whose place cannot be filled by another. He was an industrious mechanic, and had for many years been a faithful and exemplary member of the Methodist Protestant Church.—Scloto Valley Republican.
