As the poll books remain sealed in the Clerk's office for 30 days, we are unable to give official returns of the State ticket. We publish the vote for Congress as furnished us by the election officers of the respective Districts, which will give a correct idea of the general result:

THE THEORY OF SLAVERY.

Remarkable Doctrine Promulgated by a "Conservative" Organ—In citing Slaves to Insurrection.

[From the Nashville Union.]

Let every citizen, especially all non-slaveholders, read carefully the following extract from the Cincinnati "Enquirer":

"The protection of white men against slavery does not practically consist in principle, but in facts. They will not, like negroes, consent to be reduced to a state of bondage. If we had among us a race of men of our own color, with the spirit to submit, capable of labor, but without ambition or enterprise, humble, docile and flexible, there would be found no people sufficiently potent to stand in the way of their enslavement. We should have our theories upon the subject as rational as those that are founded upon the misbehavior of Ham and the maudlin morality of his exemplary parent. But the European American will not be enslaved any more than the native American. He would kick against his bonds, become turbulent, incendiary and desperate. He would rise in force, upon his master, or overcome him, by his superior intelligence. He would refuse to be coerced,—would combine for rebellion."

Now let us take up the points of this remarkable paragraph:

There is no principle, no rule of right and wrong, which keeps white men in this country out of slavery! It is simply a fact that white men are not slaves. The reason why white men are not slaves is because you cannot enslave them; if you could do it, it would be exactly right!

Slavery is all right, but it is based, not on justice but power; if you can enslave any man, do it! It would not be safe now to try to make slaves of white men; they would be "turbulent and desperate," and raise insurrections.

But as soon as we can find a class of white men "humble, docile and flexible," then "there will be no principle sufficiently potent to stand in the way of their enslavement."

We think that we can see the eyes of the sturdy soldiers of Indiana, Ohio, Illinois, Kentucky, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Pennsylvania and Kansas, sparkle and glow with indignation, as they read this "Conservative" doctrine of the Cincinnati "Enquirer"—the newspaper which a few months ago told the Ohio soldiers that their wives were turning prostitutes while they were off fighting for the Union. "What!" these men will ask, "are the advocates of slavery so bold as this, that they do not hesitate to tell us that all which saves us from slavery is that we are not quite 'humble, docile, flexible' enough? Is that all the protection for our own freedom; is that all the guarantee which our children can have against slavery, with its whips, dungeons, fetters and debaucheries? Must our sons be whipped in the field by a 'ruffian overseer,' while our wives and daughters are debauched before our eyes by our masters?"

Yes, it is even so. The "Conservative" organ of Ohio proclaims it, and other "Conservative" organs re-echo and applaud the words.

By a late Enactment of the State Legislature, the soldiers from Pennsylvania serving in the Army of the Union have the right to vote.


Read the following clipped from an Eastern Exchange:
