The connection of the Ohio river with Lake Erie by canal is a measure now entertained by the Pennsylvania Legislature. A communication addressed to a leading Senator of that body declares:—

"The Ohio river can not be said to be fully improved until its natural extension is improved—until, indeed, it shall be connected with Lake Erie. I do not think that nature ever intended that the two great internal lines of navigation on this continent, the one debouching into the Gulf of the St. Lawrence, and the other into the Gulf of Mexico, should remain forever unconnected. The physical geography of the country is full of hints for connections of these grand water thoroughfares. Thus Lake Michigan may very easily be connected with the Northern Upper Mississippi by means of several depressions crossing the intervening country; and thus the Ohio or the Eastern Upper Mississippi may also be connected with Lake Erie." The cost of this proposed work is estimated at \$20,000,000.
