The Methodist ministers of Cincinnati endorse the Gazette's project of taxing the liquor traffic in the State.

The strike at the Campbell's Creek Coal Works has ended and the miners have all returned to work.

Senator Pendleton is reported as basing his opposition to the nominees of the President for Census Supervisors on the ground that the Supervisors as well as enumerators should be appointed irrespective of party affiliations.

The U. S. Senate has rejected all nominations of Census Supervisors for the eight districts of Ohio.

The Cincinnati Gazette, in view of the action of the U. S. Senate in rejecting the Census Supervisors, on the ground that one-half were not Democrats, well remarks:—"This sets up the high ideal standard of civil service reform by the party which has never failed since the time of Jackson, in national, State, or municipal politics, to claim the last fragment of spoils falling within its reach."

On the Wing. Correspondence Gallipolis Journal. DELAWARE, OHIO, Feb. 13, 1880. DEAR OLD JOURNAL:—"As we have worked together in many ways, and for these many years, and I am rambling abroad, it now occurs to me to drop you a letter."

On the morning of the 12th inst. left the pleasant and educational city of Delaware, and her 650 students, on business. An hour's time and we halted at the magnificent R. 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Bar Meeting. A meeting of the members of the Bar of Gallia County was held at the Court House on Friday evening. The following gentlemen were present: Hon. S. S. Knowles, Hon. John Cartwright, Hon. Joseph Bradbury, S. A. Nash, Esq., D. B. Adams, C. W. Miller, Esq., Simon Nash, W. H. Harvey, Benjamin Martin, C. M. Holcomb, C. W. Bird, T. W. Hampton, W. C. H. Ecker, B. S. Waddell, A. J. Green, Alexander Vance, R. E. Dunn and Charles C. Aleshire.

On motion of S. A. Nash, Esq., Hon. Joseph Bradbury was chosen chairman, who stated that the meeting was called for the purpose of getting an expression of the Bar, as to what was best to be done to relieve and aid the Supreme Court in disposing of the large number of cases pending before it.

The Judge continuing, said: There are two courses first, to adopt a constitutional provision for a District Court, composed of Judges to be elected by the voters of each county of the State once a year; or second, to increase the number of Supreme Judges, so that one Supreme Judge may always be in attendance at the District Court, which shall be composed of one Supreme and two Common Pleas Judges, excluding the Common Pleas Judge who sat at the trial below.

At a recent meeting of the Cincinnati Bar the matter was considered, and the idea of increasing the number of Supreme Judges seemed to meet with favor, and I am not sure but that would be the surest and speediest way out of the difficulty; but we do not want here to suggest any particular plan, but to act in concert with members of the Bar elsewhere throughout the State, so that the matter may be referred to some of the best legal minds of the State.
