TAXES FOR THE YEAR 1880.

Notice to the Tax-Payers of Gallia County, Ohio.

IN PURSUANCE OF LAW, I, WM. CHERINGTON, Treasurer of Gallia County, Ohio, I hereby notify the Tax-Payers thereof, that the rate of Taxation for the year 1880 is correctly stated in the following table, showing the number of mills levied on every dollar of Taxable property in each of the incorporated Towns, Townships, and Separate School Districts of said County:

Table with columns: State Levy, County Levy, Township and Corporation Levy, Total Levy. Rows list various townships and districts like Harrison, Clay, Chambersburg Village, Gallipolis, etc.

The undersigned will attend at his office in the city of Gallipolis until the 20th day of December, 1880, to receive Taxes, after which all taxes on Real Estate remaining unpaid, will be subject to a penalty of 15 per cent. Under an Act passed May 11th, 1878, any person charged with Taxes on the Duplicate of the County, may pay the full amount of such Taxes on or before the 20th day of December next, but is required to pay one-half of said Taxes, including Road Tax and all Delinquent Tax, on or before the 20th day of December next, and the remaining half thereof on or before the 20th day of June, 1881.
