Take one and a half tablespoonfuls if barnt alum, pulverized, two spoonfuls of saltpetre pulverized; put themin one pint of yeast or one quart of sour buttermilk, put in a bottle, shake well, then pour it down the beast, and move them gently for fifteen or twenty min utes, and if the physic does not work in that time, repeat the dose.

For dry murrain, repeat the dose of yeast or buttermilk, and of saltpetre, feaving out the alum. Give as above and repeat, if necessary .- Monroe Press

Judge Coton, of Ottawa, Illinois, nnnounces in a late communication in the Prairie Farmer, that he has succeeded perfectly in granulating the syrup from the Chinese Sugar Cane; and that, too, with as much facility as he ever did from the sugar maple, except that it required a little more time.

## Township Fairs.

The editor of the Akron Beacon, after attending the Richfield tp. fair, the other day, says:

"Commend us to Township Fairs. There is the sociability of neighbors and friends,-the honorable and not envious emulation of fellow-townsmen,something of the heartiness of home Every one, we suppose, feels a degree of weariness in making his way through throngs of strangers at a crowded County or State Fair. But in a township a Fair is a sort of meeting of neighbors who know each other, and whose greetings are hearty and heartfelt."

Besides, a township fair is not so risky. If the weather is likely to be unfavorable, it can be postponed; whereas, a large County or State Fair admits of no such management. The cow, the horse, the ox, and the dog are valued much according to their habits or education -so is the man. The horse is frequently carefully trained-so is the dog; the ox and cow are as frequently "walloped into duty," as any way. I cannot see the propriety of offering premiums for well trained speed horses, and not for plow or draft horses, or oxen and well trained cows. In real importance to the farmer the latter are far preferable.
