In Memoriam. Dr. John P. Ruble was born near New Corwin, O., May 1, 1836, and died Aug. 21, 1894. He was married to Miss Lora Brown, of Willettsville, Highland county, Aug. 8, 1859. Since that time he has resided with his father-in-law, and taught school in the neighborhood, until about two years ago, when he entered the Eclectic Medical Institute, at Cincinnati, taking a complete course in medicine and graduating with high honors.

Having secured rooms and fitted them up, he began the practice of his chosen profession in New Vienna, on the first of July, only to remain a few short weeks, when the angel of death marked him for his own, and he was stricken down with disease. For four weeks he suffered with Christian fortitude and patience, never complaining until the angel of peace beckoned his weary spirit away. Like an imprisoned bird set free, his spirit took the wings of morning and flew away to rest. Dear brother thou art gone but not forgotten.

He leaves a wife and one daughter, Ethel, to mourn his loss besides a father, mother, three sisters and two brothers, Frank and Dr. Wm. Ruble, of Martinsville, a host of relatives and friends. As a husband and father, he was indulgent, loving and kind. As a friend and neighbor there was none better. He was a consistent and dutiful member of the Church of Christ, at Mt. Olive, having become a member when only fifteen years of age. His every day life and conversation only betokened the earnest zeal he felt in the work of his heavenly Father.

Twenty-eight short years mark the earthly career of one, who, like the fair flower that buds and blooms in the morning, is cut down and withered before the going down of the sun. Why a life so full of promise and youthful expectations should be so ruthlessly taken away, we cannot understand, but we must trust to the infinite wisdom of our heavenly Father, who doeth all things well. His life seems to have been one of constant labor and toil. Having so thoroughly fitted himself for the relief of suffering humanity, he had only marked out a life course of useful labor and toil. We think that the poet has beautifully described his life in the song that we have oft heard him sing. If you will bear with us we will reproduce the words.


