Where Will Spokane Stop?

Those who have witnessed the phenomenal growth of Spokane since its disastrous fire in 1889 are wondering how long it will take this young giant of the west to reach the mark set for it by its "150,000 Club." That they will get there is undoubted. The only question is how long will it take them to do it, and judging by the rapid bounds they have been making it will not be so very long.

Nor is this to be wondered at, when its many advantages are taken into consideration. With its enormous waterpower, it is not remarkable that it should attract to itself manufacturing enterprises of many varieties, and it can at the same time furnish, at a minimum of cost, power for the various electric lines which are being planned in all directions, and which will inevitably tend to bring the surrounding country into even closer relations with the parent city.

Spokane possesses the peculiar advantage of having tributary to it a rich agricultural country and a large mining territory, the one pouring into the city the wealth of the field, orchard and garden, and the other furnishing a ready and profitable market for all that can be raised.

The development of the Spokane Flats, east of the city, and extending almost to Rathdrum, Idaho, has converted what was once a dreary waste into a country of fertile gardens and orchards, connected with Spokane by electric lines, and has materially assisted in advancing the prosperity of the city. It is this stretch of country which may be found the different districts known as "Opportunities," "Ottis Orchards," and "Greenacres," which are assisting, in no slight degree, to supply the demand for garden truck, vegetables and early fruit that the city itself consumes, and which also distributes to the mining camps lying to the north and south, from the famous Coeur d'Alene mines to the Republic mining region and even into British Columbia.

Spokane is the distributing point for all that territory known as the "Inland Empire," which embraces practically the Big Bend and Palouse countries, extending from the international boundary on the north to Oregon on the south. For wheat raising and mixed farming, this territory stands without a rival, and draws most of its supplies from Spokane. Anyone desiring further information about this country should write to C. W.
