"DOG IN THE MANGER" ACT.
EDITOR NEWS-HERALD—It seems to me that the action of the Methodist church in connection with the Hillsboro College matter are to say the least inconsistent.

It was only a few years ago that they attempted both to deed and lease the property to the village of Hillsboro for school purposes, asking no compensation whatever. Now they come forward wanting between \$5,000 and \$6,000 for what they claim is their interest.

While I agree with the Methodists generally that the alleged stockholding trustees have no legal interest in this property, nevertheless they are in possession of the property and have been for a number of years and at the rate at which the cases to settle this matter have progressed in the courts in the past few years will be in possession for years to come.

Hillsboro needs more school facilities and needs them badly.
The alleged stockholding trustees offer to deed their interests to the village for \$5000. Then the Methodist conference who previously endeavored to give it away, wants \$6,000.

It strikes me that this is a sort of the "dog in the manger" act, Conference saying, "We will give this property to the village of Hillsboro as we don't want it and are not using it and will get out of a law suit with the alleged stockholding trustees." Then when the village shows an inclination to settle matters by paying the stockholding trustees for the interest they claim to hold they say "We won't dispose of our interest for less than \$6,000."

This appears to me to be hardly the position one would expect a Christian Church to take. "We don't want the property and can't use it but if anybody is going to get any money out of it we must have more than anybody else."

Is this the charity the lowly Nazarene taught and of which the Methodist church claims to be an exponent?
