APPOINTMENTS MADE**Charles Langley Gets Internal Revenue Job--McMullen and Reece Dropped.**

In the appointments of deputies made by United States Collector of Internal Revenue, A. C. Gilligan, three Hillsboro people are affected. John McMullen and James H. Reece, who have been Deputy Collectors for about thirteen years, are dropped and Charles L. Langley receives one of the appointments.

Mr. Langley is assigned to Lynchburg, the territory formerly covered by Mr. McMullen. The position carries a salary of \$1,200 and traveling expenses of \$600 per annum.

Twelve changes in the department were made by Mr. Gilligan and it is understood that all were due to politics, the men dropped being Republicans and the new appointees Democrats. The men dropped had all been appointed by former Collector Bettman.

The change is good news to Mr. Langley and his friends and a disappointment to Mr. Reece and Mr. McMullen and their friends.

The department is under civil service and Mr. Langley recently took the examination. He made an excellent record, standing seventh in a class of over 400. He is thoroughly qualified for the position.

Last Band Concert.

The Hillsboro Military Band gave its last concert of the season Tuesday night. The concert had to be abandoned on account of lack of financial support. It was only due to the liberality of a few citizens that it was possible to give as many concerts as have been. The members of the band wish to thank everyone who contributed. FATALLY INJURED.**Mrs. Chas. Teboe, of Dodsonville, Struck by Fly Wheel on Gasoline Engine.**

Mrs. Charles Teboe, of Dodsonville, was fatally injured Wednesday, when she was struck on the head by a projection on the fly wheel of a gasoline engine. Mrs. Teboe was knocked unconscious by the blow and never regained consciousness dying Monday afternoon at 3:30. Mr. Teboe was preparing to fill his silo last Wednesday. She had a gasoline engine to run the machinery. A son was helping and Mrs. Teboe was watching. He had had some experience in running a small gasoline engine. Her skull was fractured and undoubtedly she had been struck by one of the projections on the fly wheel of the engine.

Physicians were at once summoned but she never regained consciousness.

She is survived by her husband, two sons and one daughter. She was a sister of Dr. R. W. Pratt, of Pricetown. The funeral services were held Wednesday at the M. E. church at Dodsonville, interment at Dodsonville.

CANDIDATES NOMINATED**Few Contests and Little Interest Taken in the Primary-- Progressive Ticket.**

But little interest was manifested in the primary Tuesday for the selection of municipal candidates for Hillsboro and Greenfield. The Republicans had no contests in Hillsboro and only one, for mayor, in Greenfield. The Democrats had two contests, for marshal, in both Hillsboro and Greenfield.

Marshal McCormick was renominated for marshal of Hillsboro by 54 votes, receiving 156 votes to 102 for John Vaughn.

The Republicans of Greenfield nominated J. E. Durrant for mayor, he receiving 118 votes and Aaron Head 89. Thomas N. Ross defeated Frank Lytle for the Democratic nomination for marshal of Greenfield by 26 votes.

The Progressives had not filed petitions for any candidates for either Hillsboro or Greenfield. No Progressive votes were cast in Greenfield and but one in Hillsboro. The one vote in Hillsboro, however, is sufficient to nominate the men voted for and unless they resign their names will appear on the ballot this fall.

TEMPERANCE MEETING**Arrangements Were Made For Organization of League For Hillsboro.**

A temperance meeting for the purpose of organizing Hillsboro and Highland county for a fight in regard to proposed legislation was held at the Presbyterian Church on Tuesday night.

Rev. W. H. Shields acted as chairman of the meeting. L. P. Probst, of Cincinnati, representing the Anti-Saloon League, was present and made an address. The League is opposed to the bill for the small legislature, claiming it will put the control of the legislature in the hands of the cities and will retard temperance work. It favors the anti-liquor bill, which relates to the shipping and bringing of liquor into dry territory.

At a meeting Tuesday night a committee was selected with authority to choose the officers of an organization for Hillsboro, the officers to be a president, secretary, treasurer and executive committee of five. The committee to select officers is composed of Cary Roush, R. A. Haynes, T. H. Nelson, Earl Rizer and C. A. Wilkin.

The organization will probably be called the Law and Order League and in addition to taking an active part in the fight for and against the proposed legislation will be a permanent one and take charge of all temperance matters in Hillsboro.

A temperance rally will be held Sunday, Sept. 14, when representatives of the Anti-Saloon League will speak in all of the Hillsboro churches. Following this meeting the work of organizing the county by townships will be taken up.

Court News.

Two new cases were filed in the Common Pleas Court the past week.

Charles D. Johnson, as treasurer of Highland county, asks for a judgment against William and Elva B. Custer for \$108.59. The plaintiff states that the defendant are the owners of 99 acres of land in Clay township and that there is due on this land for taxes the amount of \$108.59. He prays that the land may be sold without appraisal and the proceeds applied to the payment of the taxes.

O. A. Tener, as administrator of Salome J. Hempstead asks the direction of the court as to the distribution of \$255.59 belonging to said estate. The plaintiff says that after the payment of all the debts of the decedent he had in his hands \$1022.36 that said Salome J. Hempstead had four children, Charles and Hallam and Mary C. Rhoads and Nana O'Donnell; that said son, Hallam, died many years ago, leaving as his sole heir, a son, Frederick; that said Frederick Hempstead left the state of Ohio many years ago and that for fourteen years nothing has been heard of his whereabouts.

The plaintiff further says that he paid to the children living their share of the estate; that these children claim that said Frederick Hempstead is dead and demand that his share of the estate be divided among them.

The plaintiff asks the direction of the court in the distribution of the funds in his hands.

Father and Son Die Within Hour.

On Monday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock Andrew Parker, aged about 90 years, died at his home near Cedar Chapel. Less than two hours later his son, Joseph, aged about 55 years, died at his home near Marshall.

The death of the father was sudden, he having been in his usual health until stricken with heart failure only a few minutes before his death.

A short time before the father was taken ill word came that his son, Joseph was not expected to live and members of the family at once started for his home. Before they reached it they were called back by the news of the death of the father. The son died at 7:30 that evening. His death was due to inflammatory rheumatism, which affected the heart.

Both funerals were held at Olive Branch Church on Wednesday morning at 11 o'clock.

Joseph Parker is survived by his wife and six children, four sons and two daughters.
