Not Christian Nations.

For years Germany, Austria Hungary, France, Russia and England have steadily increased the size of their armies and navies, compelling every man to do military service. Did this preserve peace? The war now raging all over Europe is the answer.

Carefully we have read the papers and magazine to find some great principle at stake for which the nations of Europe are daily slaughtering thousands of men and have been unable to find one. Selfishness, hatred, greed, jealousy and ambition of the rulers of the countries seem to be the sole causes of the war. And still those responsible for the terrible war will offer prayers to this same God asking his help and his blessing in what they are doing. By Belgian, French, England and Russian ministers will be uttered one prayer and from German, Austrian and Hungarian ministers will be offered an opposite prayer to the same God and all of them claim that they have been chosen by God as his special servants on earth.
