FORTIFIED LIKE A CHINESE WALL, GERMANS FIGHT FORMIDABLE FOE

VEDRINES WINS IN AIR BATTLE

Noted Aviator Beats German After Courageous Fight—French Birdman and a General Captured by Kaiser's Army

FROM THE BATTLE FRONT, Via Paris, Sept. 28.—The bulk of the allied armies remained today in the trenches waiting while their artillery exchanged a ferocious combat with the strongly placed German batteries.



VERDUN AGAIN IS BEING ATTACKED

Kaiser's Army Resumes Assault on Long Line of Forts—British and French Defeat—Deep in Trenches.

REPORTS FROM THE FRONT. BELLEVILLE, Mo., Sept. 28.—The following official statement was issued by the German High Command today: The French attack on the Verdun front has been repulsed. The French have been obliged to take to the rear and to retreat to their original positions.
