Illinois Election. CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—The official vote of Illinois is as follows: Lincoln, 172,545; Douglas, 160,549; Bell, 4,846; Breckinridge, 2,272. The increase of the vote over 1856 is 103,131.

Poisoning Case. PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Nov. 19.—The trial of R. S. Richardson and Sarah Ann Heald, for poisoning Stephen Healdy, (the husband of the latter,) closed today. Richardson was convicted and sentenced to the State Prison for thirty years. Mrs. Healdy was acquitted.

California Election. FORT KEARNEY, Nov. 18.—The Pony Express, with San Francisco dates to the 7th inst., arrived here last night.—The telegraphic dates are up to 10 P. M. of the 8th, from Cincinnati.

The Pony Express, with St. Louis dates to October 23d, arrived at San Francisco on the 5th inst.

The arguments in the New Almaden Quick-silver Mine case had closed, and an impression prevailed that Judge McAllister would decide for the Government, and Judge Hoffman for the claimants, rendering an appeal to the United States Supreme Court necessary before the injunction can be dissolved.

The election returns from the central counties foot up as follows: Douglas, 13,385; Lincoln, 14,342; Breckinridge, 10,438; Bell, 3,626. The vote of the State will probably exceed 120,000.

San Francisco gave Lincoln over 2,000 majority. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 8, 4 P. M. Via Ft. Kearney, Nov. 13. Editors Missouri Democrat.—About 99,000 votes are returned. Lincoln is ahead of Douglas 2,500, and expected to carry the State. Breckinridge is behind both.

THE WAY GEORGIA PROPOSES TO SECURE.

In no State of the South have the Disunion Breckinridge faction assumed a more, or indeed so tranquil a tone or unassuming demeanor towards their Union-loving fellow citizens as in Georgia; Tombs, one of their Senators of the United States, if possible, exceeding in treacherous announcements the wildest nullifier of South Carolina, whilst Iverson, his associate in the Federal Senate, acts and talks more in the vein of the Anacharsis Clootz, of the first French revolutionary times, than an American of any period. Among the measures these doughty demagogues have prepared for adoption in Georgia, since their bolt from the Democracy, the following bill, to be proposed to the Legislature on its assembling, has recently been put before the public, and the passage of which was very generally ascribed to Mr. Alfred Iverson. The bill, which would be accurately described as a measure to incite to murder and arson, has the following caption, and is in these words: "A Bill for the Protection of the Owners of Slaves in the State of Georgia—Whereas one Abraham Lincoln, a Black Republican, has been duly elected President of the United States for four years, from the 4th of March next; and whereas, it is evident to every unprejudiced mind that the whole power of said Lincoln and his coadjutors will be wielded through the Government of the United States for the destruction of the rights and liberties of the South; and whereas, the safety of the South requires that the question should be met with the most vigorous measures upon the part of the people of the sovereign State of Georgia; therefore,

Florida Election.

SAVANNAH, Nov. 17.—Official returns from sixteen counties in Florida indicate that the majority for Breckinridge in the State will be about 3,000.

Movements in Alabama. MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 17.—An immense meeting, irrespective of party, to take into consideration the present state of affairs, was held at the Capitol to-night. Mr. Yancey and Hon. Thos. Wats were unanimously nominated as delegates to the State Convention.

Progress of Liberty in Italy. NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The steamer Vanderbilt, from Southampton on the 7th, arrived here at noon today. Admiral Napier is dead. Hurst beat Paddock in five rounds, lasting 10 minutes. No knock-down blows were given.

The Piedmontese, under Victor Emmanuel, gained a brilliant victory on the 3d on the Gariglians. They attacked in front with troops, flanked by the fleet, and dispersed the Bourbon Army. Tents, wagons and stores were left in Victor Emmanuel's possession, with 11,000 prisoners.

Gen. Sonnaze pursued the enemy afterwards, and occupied Mola and the positions commanding Gaeta. Victor Emmanuel was expected at Naples immediately. Garibaldi was at Naples. Archduke reigns at Viterbo. The voting on annexation commenced at Perugia. The inhabitants of Viterbo hastened to vote, notwithstanding the French Occupation and Pontifical gendarmeries. It is reported that the conclusion of the treaty of commerce between England and Austria is unobtainable. A large body of troops remain outside. The fortress at Gaeta have sent a proposal of surrender to the Piedmontese.

A later telegram from Shanghai says it is reported that negotiations are not going on smoothly at Tientsin. Chappel's piano factory, in London, has been burnt. Twenty persons were injured.

A telegraph cable to connect Singapore and Rangoon is about to leave England. Its length is about 1,300 miles. Fresh troops left Turin for Naples. The corn crop in Italy was deficient.

Flour.—The market is unsettled, and prices generally unchanged. About 6000 bush superfine sold at \$4.60, and some small lots extra at \$4.80 to \$5.20.

Hogs.—Partly owing to the warm weather, the market was quite unsettled again to-day, and prices merely nominal. Holders finding it useless to press sales withdrew from the market. The only sale we heard of was 300 head, average 200 lbs, at \$3.12 1/2. There is no demand for future delivery.

Provisions.—Mess Pork is in moderate demand, with sales of 600 lbs at \$16.00, and it can be purchased at this price for future delivery.

Green meats nominal, which is partly to be attributed to the bad weather.—Hams sold at 7 1/2 to 7 3/4. Small sales of Lard at 10 1/2.

Groceries.—Sugar dull and low. Sales of 20 hds good fair at 7 1/2. Molasses dull at 33 to 34, with a very limited demand. Coffee low, and dull at 14 1/2 to 15 1/2. The small way prime to choice brings 15 1/2 to 15 3/4.

Wheat.—The market continues dull, and prime white declined to 1 1/2 to 1 3/4. Corn.—The market is steady, with a fair demand at 28c in bulk.

Rye.—The market is dull, but without any change in prices. We quote prime at 64 to 65c.

Barley.—The market is dull, and prices are a shade lower. We quote prime fair at 58 to 59c, and prime Western at 57 to 58c. These are the rates paid by the Brewers. Malsters are holding off for lower prices.

Hay.—The demand continues good and the market firm at 15 to 16 per ton for prime Timothy in bale, on arrival.

Wool.—The demand is moderate at 3 1/2 for Western Reserve, 10c for Hamburg, and 11c for English Dairy.

Butter.—Prime roll continues fair demand at 15 to 16c for Central Ohio and Western Reserve. Common is dull and heavy at 9 to 11c.

Apples.—There is a moderate demand for Western at 80 to 85c per bush for fair to prime. Choice New York, in large lots, are selling at 82 to 84c.

Potatoes.—The market is unchanged and dull. Prime Neshamuns are selling at 30 to 35c, on arrival. From store they are selling at 35 to 40c per bush of 2 1/2 bush.
