APRIL 10th, 1869.

Mr. P. CUNEO—I noticed a letter, in the Union last week, written by a Democrat from Carey, detailing how shamefully the Republicans at that place treated a wounded soldier in regard to the postoffice. They appear to have a great deal of sympathy, all at once, for a soldier. If my recollections serve me right one year ago last winter, there was a soldier detached for Sergeant-at-Arms in the Senate, by a gentleman from Delaware county, who never had made any sacrifices, either money or health on account of the war. Captain Bowser was one of the first that enlisted when the war broke out, and remained in the service until the war closed. He was in all the principal battles, was wounded, and partially lost his health. I notice that he was again defeated for Sheriff. Nearly all the leading Democrats were opposed to him. He had the postoffice for the office as good as any man on the ticket. I don't think their sympathy for a soldier goes very far, only when it is to their interest.

EDEN TOWN SOLDIER.

The meeting of the friends of the Sabbath reform movement in the U. B. Church on Sunday afternoon was well attended. After the opening hymn had been sung and prayer offered by Rev. I. N. Smith, Mr. Plumb, Chairman of the Committee appointed at the previous meeting, stated that the committee had found the proposed organization not very well adapted to the object in view. He, therefore, moved an entire reorganization for the purpose of giving the movement a more general character than it then had. The motion was carried, and a new organization effected by the election of T. E. Grisell, as President, and D. H. Hare, Secretary. It was further resolved to appoint an executive committee of five persons, of which the President and Secretary should be ex-officio advisory members. Messrs. Kalfner, Phibub and Rev. Klingler were also appointed on said committee. The committee were instructed to visit such persons as habitually disregard the Sabbath by keeping their places of business open on that day, and request them to cease their evil practice in so doing. Also to inquire whether any legislation is necessary to secure a better observance of the Sabbath in our midst, and to take such measures generally as they may think necessary for the attainment of that end.

The meeting after unanimously resolving to sustain said committee in all their proper efforts to carry out the object of their appointment, adjourned to meet at the Methodist church next Sabbath at half past 3 P. M., when it is hoped there will be a full attendance of all who feel an interest in this important movement.
