Letter from Gen. Rosecrans. General Rosecrans was invited to attend a Union ratification meeting, held at San Francisco, in the summer of 1867, but being unable to accept he sent a letter from which the following is an extract.

"It is clear to me that we must have a National party for the future, and equally so that its bones, sinews, life-blood and intellect must come from the Union men of the country. It ought to be and must be composed of those who, when told the Nation is lost, bravely answered, 'Never till we perish shall this catastrophe to human liberty be recorded'—of those men whose tried courage gave promise of that magnanimity which I have so often witnessed with a thrill of secret pride and joy that filled me with hope and confidence in our future.

"If I could I would say to those brave men who so frankly accept the decision of the question they fought on, cast your lot with the Union men of this nation, who opposed and fought you—trust them. Let not a few extremists, excited by vague or unfounded apprehensions, by personal interest or ambition, prevent you from meeting the great body of the National Union men represented by Congress, and closing forever the agitation about reconstruction. This is our common country. You are our brethren. You shall not become excited against you because a few hot-heads or a few deceiving politicians attempt to work on your feelings for their own advantage. Meet us with trust and cordiality, satisfy the apprehensions (even if you know they are unfounded) of a true though unformed loyalty, and you will find us braver, truer and more generous friends than those who claim pre-eminence, to admire you and deplore your present situation. These are my profound convictions. I rely on the men who fought and labored for the unity of the nation to be the most intelligent and persistent maintainers of the autonomy of the States against the extremes of anarchy and consolidation. I know the men of the South ought, by the instincts of conservatism, courage and interest, to be with them. If these views are correct, it is obvious that there should be no wavering in their support of the present general policy of Congress, however its details may or may not require modification. No Representative ought to be elected to Congress on platforms of open or covert opposition to measures wherein fidelity is more important than detail.

Maxims for Young Ladies. Keep your clothing, especially your under clothing, in perfect order. Never let your duty as a button or strings take the place of proper bands. Examine every garment when it comes from the wash, and, if necessary, mend it with neatness and precision. Do not sew up the holes in your stockings, as we have seen some careless, untidy girls do; but take in a broad margin around the hole, be it small or large, with a fine darning needle and darning cotton, and cover the fracture with an interlaced stitch, so close as to be strong as the body of the stocking, and fine enough to be ornamental. Stockings mended in this way will darn long, and very few times in the course of their existence. Never carry coarse embroidered or laced handkerchiefs. Fine plain ones are much more lady-like. Avoid open-worked stockings and very fancy slippers. Fine plain, white hose, and black kid slippers, with only a strap or rosette in front, are more becoming.

Train yourself to some useful occupation. Remember it is wicked to waste time, and nothing gives an impression of vanity and self-indulgence as a habit of idling and never having anything to do. If you are in your father's house take some department of household labor upon yourself, and a part of the sewing, and make it your business to attend to it. Do not let a call from this idle girl, or a visit from that, or an invitation from the other, interfere with the performance of your duty. Let your pleasures come in as recreation, not as the business of your life. If you want to marry, do not court to try to attract the attention of gentlemen. A little wholesome indifference, real or assumed, will be much more likely to accomplish the object. Consider, moreover, that it is better to be a woman than a wife, and do not degrade your sex by making your whole existence turn on the pivot of matrimony. If you can, cultivate to perfection some art by which you can gain an independent livelihood. Do it whether there is a necessity for it or not. Do it quietly, if you will, but do it. There is no telling when, or under what circumstances, you may need it.

The Democracy in Trouble.

Democratic office holders are immaculate fellows. The citizens of Columbus, the Democratic stronghold of the State, are just now giving vent to their admiration of the renown achieved by the Democratic Treasurer of Franklin county, as will be seen by the following special dispatch to the Cincinnati Commercial: COLUMBUS, July 19.—The troubles of the Democracy do not come singly. The Rosecrans does not tear the faithful up terribly; but now a new cause of alarm comes in the shape of the failure of A. C. Headley & Co., whose liabilities are considerable. John G. Thompson, the chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee, is a member of the defunct firm, and it is feared that campaign contributions will not come in very freely, when this fact is taken into consideration, together with the dissolution of partnership heretofore existing in the banking business between Baily & Thompson.

Mr. Headley is the present County Treasurer, and is a candidate for re-election. Senator Thurman soon leaves for California, to be gone almost the entire campaign. So, between it all, the Democrats feel they have no Executive Committee, and a chance for a dismal canvass. During my long residence at the State Capital I have never seen a more disconsolate set than some of the Democrats are here to-night. At the instigation of the bondsmen of Mr. Headley, Judge Pugh has appointed O. P. Hines to make a special examination of the county treasury, and a watchman to guard the vaults until the examination is completed. Up to this time all looks well for Headley. The failure is the all-absorbing theme of conversation here to-night.

Since the above was put in type, we learn that an investigation has been made, and the treasury found all right—Ed. Rep.

Homes for Soldiers Orphans. The last Republican state convention took ground in the right direction when it incorporated into its platform a resolution in favor of establishing a home for soldiers' orphans of the state of Ohio by the appropriation of part of the funds of the state treasury. This duty is one of the remaining legacies of the war. The maimed soldiers are already provided for by the Dayton National Asylum, but no provision has as yet been made for the support of soldiers' orphans, whose fathers have laid down their lives for the cause of the Republic, and who are left desolate and destitute, with no aid save that of individual benevolence. No charity is more deserved or more useful than such a one as this would be. The movement has been organized by the Grand Army of the Republic, but we are glad to see that the great party of the Union proposes to take the work into the hands of the state, and making it the work of the people. The work does not belong alone to the Grand Army of the Republic, most of whose members are not able to bear the pecuniary outlay necessary to make the movement a success. The pledges made to these brave men, as they were leaving home and friends to protect our firesides and defend American liberty—that their children should not suffer want, or themselves be forgotten by a grateful people—should now be fulfilled to the fullest extent.

A state convention of the Grand Army has been called at Put-in-Bay, on the 22d of the present month, to which all are invited, for the purpose of agreeing upon some definite plan of action to secure the success of this noble undertaking. The semi-annual convention of the Grand Army meets at the same time and place, and we sincerely hope that the comrades, and all other interested, will attend this meeting with a determination to sink all minor differences in the great object of fraternity, charity and loyalty. The Union party has announced its determination to advocate the construction of a central home for soldiers' orphans. The Democratic convention, who maintain, though they disagree, their ancient hatred for the soldiers, has ignored the question. But the next legislature which will pretty surely be Republican, will carry out the pledges of the party, and the duty of the state toward the orphans of the war will be done.—Cleveland Leader.
