Letter from the 154th.

GREENLAND GAP, W. Va., June 22d, 1864.

EDITOR SENTINEL:

I have just finished reading a letter from your correspondent, "Miles," of the 74th, criticizing a letter from the correspondent of the "Greene County Journal," a member of the 154th Ohio National Guards.

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GREENLAND GAP, W. Va., June 21st, 1864.

EDITOR SENTINEL:

It is pleasant sitting in the tent with the curtains raised so that the gentle breeze may pass through and destroy the power of old life's burning rays, which he is endeavoring to make us feel, and write to friends at home.

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was heavy fighting all the afternoon yesterday and all last night, and it will, judging this morning about two miles from our position. Our brigades in front of the boys are getting some rest, which is much needed. Yesterday evening we drew whiskey rations, and I think it all right for we have not had on a dry ditch for a week. At times we have to lay down in mud and water, and for several days it has been raining all the time. The rebels make their main attack before going into battle, our boys get only short rations, and that after the fighting is over our troops are in the best of spirits, and during well-ordered than ever we did before during a campaign. The boys are running the point. Col. Given, although hardly able to get about, is still with us, and I hope he will remain, for he is half the regiment himself. We are now five miles from Marietta. The Xenia boys are all well, I believe except Jimmie Johnson, in our Co. He has been sent to the hospital.
