

It is the evident desire of the radicals in Congress to force negro suffrage upon the people of the District of Columbia, for the purpose of manufacturing political capital for their constituencies at home. This has drawn from the people of the District the most earnest remonstrance. The obnoxious measure is favored by members from sections of the Union whose States have but recently given it emphatic condemnation at the ballot-box. The City Councils have issued a call for an expression of public opinion by ballot to-day, the 21st, so that citizens may have an opportunity of expressing their disapproval of such odious legislation. It is stated that a member from Ohio will introduce a bill in the House shortly to repeal the charter of the city of Washington as well as the laws for local government in other portions of the District of Columbia, and place the government of Washington in the hands of three commissioners, thus depriving the people of all suffrage. This is the compromise which, it is said, Western members will accept on the negro suffrage question.

An Important Duty.
We clip the following article from the Ohio Statesman, which we think should be read and acted upon by every Democrat in Carroll county:

He was stricken down by an attack of paralysis on Friday evening last, whilst attending a social reunion of his personal friends from Ohio, and remained unconscious up to the hour of his decease. Mr. Corwin was born in Bourbon county, Kentucky, July 29, 1793.

Forty Millions in Sixty Days.
It is stated that on the 15th instant, about eleven millions of interest on the United States public debt fell due, (second series of seven-thirty notes); one month hence eight and a half millions will be paid on the third series; and January 1st ten millions of gold interest has to be met for long bonds. These, with the maturing obligations of the Treasury, making, for sixty days, an aggregate of forty millions of disbursements for principal and interest of the public debt.

Maryland Sunday School Teachers.
A convention of Sunday School teachers of Maryland was held in Baltimore last week. Among other proceedings, a resolution was adopted instructing the business committee to appoint an executive committee of one for each county and two from the city of Baltimore, and to consider the feasibility of the plan of organization as proposed in the convention of 1863. Resolutions were then adopted in regard to temperance, and requesting the ministers to preach on the subject in their churches on the second and third Sundays in January next, and also requesting the business committee to report a draft of a "lesson" for the children on temperance. The business committee reported for discussion the questions, "The Mission of the Sabbath Schools as an auxiliary of the Church," and "How best to extend Sunday School work over the State." Many of the gentlemen present made short addresses on these subjects, giving their experience and opinions on the questions presented. The convention adjourned to meet in Frederick city on the second Tuesday of December, 1866.

PRICES IN YORK COUNTY, PA.
The following items are from the York Pennsylvanian:
The retail price of lard all through the fall, and indeed, up to the present time, has been 30 cents per pound, while it has brought 28 cents at wholesale.—That much needed article, like pork, is declining in price. Recently farmers have sold lard by the can at 20 and 25 cents per pound. In consequence, we presume, of the abundance and cheapness of corn, the price of beef and pork is gradually declining in our market. The best pork may now be purchased for 14 and 15 cents per pound.
