Manure for the Irish Potato.
Stable manure has been much used by Virginia farmers for the Irish potato, and many, no doubt, regard it as the one perfect and complete manure for this crop. It is excellent for the purpose beyond a doubt, as are also other forms of domestic animal manure. But the farmer can hardly afford to take this manure for the purpose, and we hold that no animal manure is exactly suitable for the potato. Of course a plant must partake, to some extent, of the nature of the food it imbibes, and if the food is rich the plant cannot entirely escape contamination. This being the case, it is worth while, in a sanitary point of view, to pay some attention to the nature of the plant foods of the crops upon which we ourselves feed.
Now, not only can the farmer find better use for his animal manures than to employ them in the production of potatoes, but he can get a cheaper one from his woods, and with the aid of a little superphosphate to quicken action, an equally effective one as to results. Well rotted litter, such as may be scraped up on any farm, has been found excellent for the potato, used in conjunction with superphosphate. The latter alone will not act near as well as does when the litter is also applied. The potato is a crop that seems absolutely to demand some coarse material in the ridge for the potatoes to grow in. There is no doubt that it is because it keeps the ridge mellow, and it gives the tubers room to grow. A very light sprinkle of the phosphate, with plenty of rich pine straw mould, will produce as good a crop of potatoes as a full application of stable manure.
The litter should be at least half rotted, and the entire trench made for planting, the sets should be filled with it. The sets may be dropped first, the litter put upon them and the superphosphate applied on top of the mould. Or the plan may be reversed by putting the superphosphate first, the litter upon that and the potato above all.
A piece of land planted thus to potatoes in March or April, and the crop removed in July, would afford a most desirable preparation for a turnip patch next fall. It would be fine for winter cabbages or collards also, the latter a crop (much neglected) that ought to be planted largely for ewes, milch cows, &c., in winter.
We advocate this cheap manure for the potato. Let the stable and cow manure be spread over the clover and oat patches early in spring, or applied to the corn land, trucks, &c. It will pay better thus. Rotten pine straw and good commercial fertilizer in small quantity will do for the potato, especially in the interior, where none is raised for market.
How an Iowa Dairyman Milks.
The following, from *The Dairy*, contributed by an Iowa dairyman, shows what absolute cleanliness means: "It is said that it is as hard to be clean as it is to be good. Well, I think it is not hard to be good, even for a dairyman, if he only does as he would be done by, and just as easy to be clean. This is my method of doing it: At five o'clock I turn out the cow stables, the feed prepared the night before is put into the feed boxes, which are first cleaned of all remnants of former food; and, if sour, they are scoured out with warm water and a broom. While the cows are eating they are thoroughly cared and brushed, as well as any well-kept horse is, and all over, from head to tail. The udder is sponged, if necessary, and wiped with a clean towel, and not a dirty rag. The gutters are then cleaned out, and the stalls, a common road broom being used to finish after a broad scraper, which draws the manure down to the traps doors into the cellar. The floor and the gutters are then littered well with sawdust, when we have no straw. For fifteen cows this takes an hour. Then I go to breakfast. At half-past six the cows are milked, and each milk pail has a clean strainer in it. The milk is not ready necessary, as I would cheerfully drink a glass of milk direct from the cow as I milk it. But out of consideration for my customers who buy my butter and milk, I put the milk through three strainers. As soon as the deep pails are full they are closed and carried to the milkhouse and handed to the creamery, or if it is put into shallow pails, it is done at once. Now, there is nothing hard to do about this. It is so easy after having begun it and got into the way of it, that it would be hard to stop it. And I don't see how it is easier to be cleaner than we are in our dairy."
Asbes.
Save all the asbes from the fire-places, and put them on the smoke-house or cellar floor, where they will keep dry till wanted for use. Then at the time of planting corn have a hand to go along before the planters with a bucket of asbes, and drop a full single handful immediately under each hill. As the asbes are put down, let the hand knock over it a little dirt with the foot, and then set the foot upon the spot for the corn to be planted. In this way the planters will know just where the asbes are deposited, and will not fail to get the seed in the right place. A handful of good hard wood asbes, such as are usually made in every country fire-place in winter, will make a good strong stalk of corn grow on quite poor land, and each stalk will yield an ear of solid grain that without the asbes would be but sorry stuff. There is no better fertilizer than asbes of hard wood, and being in a concentrated form, a very little of it is required to make good corn. There is probably no better use to make of it than to put it all under the corn. Two or three bushels is enough for an acre of corn, a handful to the hill, and as the asbes cost nothing, it thus becomes the cheapest and best fertilizer for corn that can be employed. We have during the winter saved up quite a lot of asbes, which we intend to use in the above way, having been led to this way of fertilizing corn by the advice and practice of an old farmer, who always makes plenty of good sound corn. It is important to keep the asbes dry till used. —*Petersburg Index-Appel.*
The woodpecker, which apparently destroys the trees by their constant drilling, are only after the insects, and often save trees that would be destroyed by their aid. There is no bird more valuable to an orchard than the woodpecker, and the surest sign of insect depredations under the bark is the visits of the woodpecker to the trees. He never attacks the trees unless in search of food.
