

Wonderful Feats of Marksmanship.

Pittsburg Pa., Post. Rev. W. L. McGrew, a young Methodist minister of Somerset county, was in Pittsburg recently on a visit to his friends. He was the guest of Rev. Riley, of the South Side. On Thursday evening he went to Finleyville, Washington county, on a visit. Rev. Mr. McGrew is well known in Western Pennsylvania. He is a native of West Elizabeth, in this county. He has been a member of the Methodist ministry for probably ten or fifteen years, maybe longer. It is not of his ability as a minister, but of his marvelous skill in shooting that this article will treat. Many of his acquaintances do not know that he is probably the finest marksman in America, not excepting Carver and Bogardus. From boyhood he has been passionately fond of firearms, and the experience, skill and accuracy with which he can handle a revolver, shotgun or rifle, entitle him to rank in their use without a known equal. He has never sought to make any display of his acquirements in this respect, because he has not coveted notoriety. Target shooting has been pursued as a pleasant pastime in his hours of recreation, and he has thought or desire of ever being brought to public notice by it. But the feats which he accomplishes with ease are so incredible that the Post is certain he will pardon its relation of some of them purely as a matter of interest to its readers.

Bogardus and Carver have never accomplished anything with shotgun or rifle which Rev. McGrew has not been able to duplicate. But he can teach them feats which they can execute them or not, they have never attempted. One of these is the breaking with a repeating rifle of two ordinary glass drinking goblets thrown into the air together before either falls to the ground. He cuts one of the goblets in twain at the stem, lowers his rifle to his hip to throw out the empty shell and reload, and then breaks the other of the goblets at the stem, but is serene under the knowledge that he has never heard of any one able to duplicate even this feat.

Another thing he does is to shoot through the mouth of a pop-bottle thrown up in the air and knock the bottom out. The bottle is thrown so that at every revolution the mouth is presented to him. He shoots with a rifle through the mouth and strikes the bottom out. It takes a quick eye, steady nerve and accurate judgement, but Rev. McGrew does it.

These feats, he says, are comparatively easy of accomplishment. One that is still more difficult is to shoot with repeating rifle two glass balls thrown in opposite directions from a trap. At the county fair last fall at Somerset he was invited to give a public exhibition of his skill. He consented to do so, provided the event should not be surrounded with any circumstances that would detract from the dignity of his calling. On that occasion he first broke thirty single balls thrown from a trap, hitting everyone at the first fire. Then he broke his hand at fifteen double balls, and then broke every pair. Of the sixty balls he did not miss one. All this was done with a rifle. Ex-Governor Hoyt was a witness of the exhibition, and pronounced it the most phenomenal display of marksmanship he had ever seen.

There are only a few illustrations of the feats of Rev. McGrew in this line. He is a revolver and shotgun are as close as those with the rifle.

Air is forced into the down-cast shafts at the rate of 60,000 cubic feet per minute. The 90,000,000 cubic feet of air taken into the depths daily has to be so distributed that it will reach all of the working forces, which is in itself a troublesome matter. Then there is the cost of keeping the mines clear of water. Copious springs and numerous streams are encountered which require extensive and powerful machinery to pump out. The great height to which much of this water has to be raised is one of the chief embarrassments and has caused the abandonment of some of the lower workings. Few of these deep mines are paying to-day, but still the work goes on chiefly for the honor of the stamping mill and furnaces which work the ores at so much per ton. Unless something unexpected happens in the way of mining discoveries Nevada will have hard work to keep its population from falling off considerably. It was only 60,000 in 1880. Mining is hard work. Mining for the precious metals is especially so, and it is greatly to be regretted that it does not produce more permanent result in improving the soil that attracts it.
