**THE "TRAITORS" OF TODAY.**  
From Wilmington, (Del.) Every Evening. Satire and irony have seldom been so effectively employed in presenting salient truths as in the following reference to the "traitors" of today by the Iowa Moines, Iowa, Gazette.

The address of Wm. E. Mason of Illinois before the graduating class of the law department of Drake University at Central City, Iowa, recently was raked with the spirit of treason.

This man, who by some unscrutable dispensation of a mysterious Providence occupies a seat in the Senate of the United States from Illinois, had the audacity to declare repeatedly that the war in the Philippines was an outrage and was wholly unjustifiable. He started out with the ridiculous assumption that Congress alone had power to declare war and quoted from the Constitution of the United States.

This Senatorial traitor has evidently just awakened from a Rip Van Winkle nap, else his ignorance is incalculable. The world, and especially that part of it known as the United States of America, has moved since that old instrument was adopted. Manifest destiny has made the old Federal Constitution an obsolete back number, and the power to declare war has been enlarged until now naval or military officer can open the ball whenever he deems it advisable to civilize the heathen of any country where he may land and raise the glorious banner of the free.

To further illustrate his obtuseness, this Senatorial traitor had the supreme gall to quote from the Declaration of Independence and claim that this old chestnut was still entitled to reverence and respect.

Hasn't Mason sense enough to know that the higher criticism of these days has taken a fall out of the Bible and the old Declaration? It was only a few days ago that Parson Henson, of Mason's own town, very properly denounced the Declaration of Independence as a devilish lie palmed off on a credulous nation. Washington, Jefferson, Webster and Lincoln are dead and the conditions are changed.

And he said to the shame of Des Moines that this manfuling statement was loudly applauded. In fact, it must be admitted with shame and humiliation that a majority of his audience manifested their approval by applause.

**Disastrous Storms in Maryland.**

**SANDY SPRING, June 9.**—One of the severest thunderstorms ever known to pass over Montgomery county occurred this afternoon, and was accompanied by high wind and a very heavy rainfall. At Spencerville it was exceptionally severe, and one man was struck in the chest by lightning and killed, and his two companions badly shocked. Bert Black, Bess Dorsey and Richard Thomson, the two latter colored men, were engaged by Charles Osler to pick strawberries. As the storm approached, these men sought shelter from the rain under a crate shed built in the field. Jeddie Yerkes, a young man who was engaged in strutting the berries, refused to remain in this building, and drove to the house of Mr. Osler, a short distance off. After the storm had abated, Yerkes heard someone calling, and he and Mr. Osler drove to the field, finding Dorsey dead, Thomas living, but badly shocked, and a number of trees were uprooted, and a number of fruit trees were broken. Black and Thomas are now out of danger, but the latter's life was despaired of several hours. The fact that he fell outside in the rain no doubt saved his life. Dorsey was about 25 years of age. At Brookville a number of trees were uprooted, and a considerable hail fell, doing little if any damage. At Rockland, the home of Henry C. Halliwell, a tree was blown on the house, damaging it considerably.

At Brighton and Unity a severe hail-storm of afternoon of last week. The storm came suddenly, and was accompanied by a little lightning. Great damage was done peach orchards and to growing wheat. The storm came from the westward and the wind blew with tornado-like force. The building in course of erection by Wm. M. Armstrong for the new ice plant was torn from its foundation and moved four feet, the brick foundation destroyed, and the framework was badly wrecked and broken.

It will be necessary to tear down the structure and rebuild before the machinery can be placed in position. The path of the storm was about a mile wide, Centerville being about the centre.

In the Middletown Valley, Frederick county, a fierce hailstorm did considerable damage to farm and garden crops on the 9th instant. The windows of a house occupied by William Routzahn, on the farm of Rev. L. A. Man, were broken by hailstones of large size. Much damage was done to wheat, clover, garden truck and fruit. A cow was killed by lightning on the farm of Joshua Ahalt. Mrs. Ahalt was stunned by the bolt.

In the southern section of Somerset county Friday's storm was the severest for many years, and great damage has resulted to the growing crops and orchards. The centre of the storm seemed to be in the vicinity of Marion, where the greatest damage is reported having done on the farm of S. Frank Miles. A tenant house on this place, occupied by a colored family, was destroyed by a small colored child was carried by the wind a distance of a quarter of a mile. When found the child was destitute of clothing but uninjured. Several other families belonging to Mr. Miles were also blown to pieces.

A letter from Toddville, Dorchester county, says the storm there was one of the most destructive with rain and hailstones ever known in that section. The fall force was felt at about 5.30 p. m., and it lasted for about 30 minutes. During that time it was, on account of the blinding rain, impossible to see any of the damage done or doing. After the storm had passed over, it was found that several trees were over completely or smashed down to the ground, while others were lifted from their foundations and burst open and otherwise damaged. The hall, a large and substantial building, nearly new, was lifted from its foundation and carried a distance of 12 feet and laid on its side. Fortunately no lives were lost, though the wife and three-year-old child of Mr. A. C. Meredith were severely injured in one of the wrecked houses. Others escaped before the houses fell.

**Pathetic Statement Made in Court.**  
WILMINGTON, DEL., June 9.—In the Superior Court here today the name of Walter Bacon was stricken from the rolls of attorneys practicing at the New Castle Bar, and it was done upon his own application. Several days ago application was made by the Senior Committee of the Bar asking for a rule to have Mr. Bacon's name taken from the list of practicing attorneys, he having been charged with committing offences unbecoming a lawyer, and he had been fined several times in the City Court. When court opened this morning and the rule against Mr. Bacon was called, the young attorney arose and said: "May it please the Court, it is with a feeling of more than distress that I appear before your Honors. I desire now, before I speak of the rule which is returnable today, to tender my apologies as a man—as a sober man—to the Court and to this Bar for anything I may ever have done while I was intoxicated. With reference to the rule, after conference with my friends on the other side, I am going to ask your Honors to permit me to ask that my name be stricken from the roll of attorneys of this Bar, on my application."

The papers in the case were ordered sealed, so that their contents will never be known, this being done at the request of Mr. Bacon. At the conclusion of the ruling Mr. Bacon left the court room greatly depressed and visibly affected.
