News of the Week

The second pair of twins in less than 15 months were born June 24 to William Martin, of Lancaster, Pa.

John Keny, of Conewago township, Adams county, Pa., sold a load of new wheat to the Hanover Milling Company last Saturday.

The 29th Sargent of the North American Sargentball was held in Cincinnati this week. The citizens committee raised over \$100,000 for the event.

Rev. Robert W. Oliver, D. D., rector of St. Luke's Protestant Episcopal Church, at Kearney, Nebraska, died in the Episcopal Hospital, Philadelphia, Pa. June 23, aged 85 years.

Colonel Evan Miles, First Infantry, who has been in bad health since his return from Cuba last year, has been ordered to report to a Retiring Board, of which Major General Shafter is President, for examination for retirement.

Professor Thomas F. Christwhite, of Boston, was on Saturday elected Supervising Principal of the public schools of Hanover, Pa., at a salary of \$1,050 an increase over the salary paid the retiring Superintendent, Prof. A. J. Harbaugh.

At noon on Monday fire entirely destroyed the Michigan Central freight house, Hamilton and Dayton freight house, burned 100 loaded cars, the aggregate loss amounting to over \$300,000, a very small part of which is covered by insurance. Two men were seriously injured.

John Shields, an East Side New York schoolkeeper, was the victim early Sunday morning of three clever thieves, who not only robbed him of his watch and the contents of his cash box, but left him locked securely in the ice box in his saloon. That he did not slowly freeze to death was owing to the chance arrival of a man who heard his shouts for help and liberated him.

Julius Davis, an insane patient at Madison, Wisconsin, informed the doctors that he had at different intervals swallowed nails, wire, etc., and begged of them to remove them and relieve his suffering. As they proceeded with the operation they found imbedded in the stomach and intestines a ball of nails of all sizes, two pocketknife blades and several pieces of twisted wire.

The Danish Steamship Alexandra, sailed from Newport News, Sunday morning for Copenhagen, Denmark, having aboard the twenty locomotives built for the Government of Sweden by the Richmond (Virginia) Locomotive Works. This order was filled in a few months after the war, and is of especial interest as the largest consignment of American built engines ever sent abroad.

T. D. Tanner, one of the foremost Red Men in the United States, was arrested at Easton, Pa., June 23, on a charge of embezzling \$1,108 of the funds of the Seneca Tribe, of Easton. Tanner is a member of the Grand Council of the United States, and was for years its journal clerk. He is an authority on Red Men's work, and known from the Atlantic to the Pacific coast. Bill was fined at \$1,000.

Charles A. Pillsbury, of Minneapolis, Minn., says the winter wheat crop is a failure. So far as the Northwestern spring wheat area is concerned, the crop is looking and doing fairly well. In some low places there may be slight damage from too much rain, but on the whole, with favorable weather conditions from this time forward, there ought not to be any reason why we should not have up here a reasonably abundant crop.

An angry mule at Atlanta, Ga. county, Mo., put the entire police force of the town to flight one day last week, and killed several horses and severely injured another before it was despatched with a club. The mule belonged to an old dandy. In the morning it lost its temper over something and proceeded to annoy the town, and finally to call out the police force. The first assault the officers used bricks. Then the mule charged, and one of the officers of the law saved himself by crawling under a house. The mule had things pretty much its own way for half an hour, but presently the arm of the law reached out and gathered it in.

About 1.15 a. m. last Saturday, a fire was started in a room at Laurel, Del. The town has no water and at least 100 dwellings, stores, etc., were burned. Assistance from Wilmington, Del., and Salisbury, Md., checked the fire before the town was wiped out. Loss over \$500,000; insurance \$200,000. Only 3,000 population.

Laurel, Md., railroad shows that heavy rain, accompanied by hail and wind, did much damage.

A railroad bridge east of Condo was carried away and another west of that place had an end washed out.

North of Kearney, a large dam on Wood River was carried away. About 60 sections of land in Wood River Valley, along the Kearney and Black Hill Railroad, was devastated by hail and wind. The largest range tank of the Kearney Gas Company was flooded, entailing a loss of nearly 6,000 gallons of gas.

The storm was the worst that ever passed over this section.

A Remarkable Case. CHARLOTTE, N. C., June 26.—A white man, named Parsons, whose home was at Lenoir, N. C., was run over by a Southern Railway train last night, thirty miles north of here. He was brought to Charlotte, and died about thirty minutes after reaching here.

His body was entirely severed below the waist, and while lying on a stretcher talking to a physician the unfortunate man saw the lower half of his body removed to another part of the room, and commented on it. He told the name of the man who had cut off his head, and in a few moments said to the doctors that he had only a few more minutes to live, and asked that he be given something to stop the pain.

The doctor administered an opiate, and Parsons became quiet and died in a few minutes. The man was about twenty-one years of age and was beating his way on the train when killed.
