THE GROWING OF ALFALFA.

A Paper Read by Charles A. Cunningham, Esq., to the Members of the Baltimore County Gunpowder Agricultural Club at the Residence of Mr. E. Gitting Merryman, May 25.

Alfalfa has been cultivated since the early dawn of civilization. It was grown by the Egyptians, the Greeks and the Romans, and by the latter spread over a large part of Europe. The Spanish Monks, when they came to give the Mexicans "benevolent assimilation," brought Alfalfa with them and around those old adobe missions which they established over 300 years ago it can be found growing today.

About 1855 to 1860 it was carried up the south-west coast to California and from that place it is rapidly spreading to the Middle Western States. It is now making a rapid stride into Nebraska, Kansas and Colorado blossom like a rose. It enables the farmers of the above States to market the Grade Whiteface, the symmetrical 1600 pounds by feeding a balanced ration of 15 to 20 lbs. of Alfalfa hay and 40 to 60 lbs. of corn Silage; the entire ration being produced upon their farms. Alfalfa is the chief of the leguminous plants and is greatest of them all as a soil improver.

I have had seven seasons experience with ten acres of Alfalfa as a source of protein for our dairy herd of Jersey and grade Jerseys, during which time we have had in our valley three of the finest summers known in many years and during these hot dry times in former years and bringing to the surface and giving our herd a green and succulent ration rich in protein as only the king of the leguminous family could do. So firm is my faith that Alfalfa is one of nature's choicest gifts to the dairy herd that we are building up and preparing a hundred acres of our best land which we will lay down in Alfalfa.

The most desirable soil for Alfalfa is the bottom lands of the Gunpowder valley lands. Lands that will grow 10 to 15 lbs. of corn to the acre will produce when once established 5 to 6 tons to the acre and give 4 cuttings. It yields its greatest crops on a soil formed from decomposed limestone. The preparation of soil for a field of this valuable plant requires two or three years. Energy and expense you should not spare, as it outlines a work for your lifetime and your children that come after you. It will pay you to see to it that you have a few years you can draw upon it for the remainder of your life, and select clover land to those that can afford it.

In preparing my field I select clover land that I intend to plant to Essilage corn. As soon as I have cut the clover for the last time I commence at once to cover it with manure.

This work I do during the fall and winter, ground barley or oats. Both of these rations are fairly balanced, are grown upon your farms and it make you independent of the market products. The best results in dairying and feeding steers are obtained in conjunction with the Silo, and every farmer who is preparing a field for Alfalfa should build himself a stone Silo, (wooden Silos are makeshifts and are not permanent), round in form, 30 to 40 feet deep, and 16 feet in diameter, will give him about 200 tons of fine feed. I plant my ensilage corn in 4 feet rows and 8 to 12 inches apart in the rows. The white corn (the Silo) or Maryland makes the best. I sow a field in cow peas in June and they are ready for the Silo when the corn is ready. I cut 1 cut corn and 4 cow peas 1 inch length and pack them in as tight as I can in the Silo. The corn ground barley or oats. Both of these rations are fairly balanced, are grown upon your farms and it make you independent of the market products. 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
