

New York Fashions.

From Our Regular Correspondent.

Traveling cloaks are in special favor this year and come in mohair, often showing bright pink or blue, taffeta silk, pongee or cloth. Shapes are the long sack or fitted, the latter of course more dressy.

The traveling dress should clear the ground and be completed by the little Kion jacket opening over a shirt waist and the hat in outing style, of which there are many new shapes, another sign of women's outdoor life.

Lunch baskets proper are more used by outing parties than those who travel by rail or boat, since buffet cars, lunch counters and dining tables on boats, go largely towards supplying needs of the inner man.

High grade lunch baskets are really remarkable examples of what art can supply in a small compass. Plates are square, metal bound and stowed in close rows; knives and spoons take up scarce any room; tight jars hold butter and china lined metal boxes, fitted fitting and close together, accommodate viands, while a kettle with alcohol lamp is provided for making tea, with flasks that presumably are not empty.

Traveling satchels according to size, are fitted with a greater or less number of conveniences, beginning at small hand bags that hold merely the purse and note book with room for the handkerchief and one or two small articles. From this, an increase is seen, till the larger are receptacles for all that is useful. Manicure sets keep the hands in nice condition; comb, brush, soap receptacle and two bottles respectively for Bay Rum and Murray & Lurman's Florida Water, that old time and ever popular fragrance, a recognized necessity to every traveler who values creature comfort, since after exposure in the sun or during the fatigues of a journey, its refreshing qualities are beyond compare.

Bridesmaids' dresses are delightful examples of all that is best in thin fabrics and usually very ornate in garniture, lace, of course, being most prominent. When colors are chosen, pink or blue are most frequent, the glare of red or tones of green or yellow being, in general, thought inappropriate. An element of poetry must surround the bridal altar, and the blush of pink or the innate refinement of blue, render them truly appropriate. In harmony with the sup posed dignity of the bride, her girl attendants forego the levity of low neck and sleeves must reach at least to the elbow.

Silk mall, a fabric somewhat heavier than mousseline, is in much favor and a recent introduction is to lay fine organdie in floral patterns, over taffeta silk and in this is draped by white net, which gives a lovely, dreamy appearance.

Commencement gowns are much simpler than the foregoing and silken textures are debarred in favor of sheer cottons. In these, organdie leads, with abundance of lace in trimming, some waists and sleeves being made entirely of lace insertion alternating with narrow tucks. As may be presumed also in this day of tucks, they are not omitted and shirtings play a part, flounces or ruffles being a foregone conclusion. Jacket fronts or simulations of the same, may also be taken for granted, but great number of corsages show fronts turned back with revers over yokes, that are really old fashioned chemisettes come up again and this the more, since they harmonize with undersleeves, likewise of olden time.

The Berry Crop Being Harvested.

IN THE ADVOCATE of April 27 was published a description of Mr. W. F. Allen's fruit farms in Wisconsin and Somerset counties, Maryland, and now we offer our readers some account of the crops being shipped from that section to Eastern and Northern markets. A letter from Salisbury, June 9, says:

"Some idea of the fruit growing in this section can be gained from the fact that one grower, W. F. Allen, is shipping daily from 30,000 to 40,000 quarts of strawberries.

Mr. Allen leads two to three refrigerators cars daily on a siding which the railroad company has run to his berry farm. He is the most extensive grower of small fruits in the United States. On his farms near town he has 50 acres in strawberries, 50 acres in dewberries and 100 acres in cantaloupes. When the strawberry crop is over he will be begin shipping dewberries and expects to load two cars daily; then will follow the cantaloup crop. This will be immense, and it is expected he will load two to three cars every day. In addition to his fruit farm here, Mr. Allen has 100 acres in strawberries on the Egypt Farm, in Somerset, which he recently purchased for \$9000.

The next heaviest grower of small fruits are Stator, Sweet & Co., who have in bearing this season 75 acres of variety of strawberry, the Gandy Prize. In Somerset county they have 50 acres more. Their shipments this season will be at least 400,000 quarts of strawberries. They have contracted to supply one Boston firm with 100,000 quarts for making wine.

Then the firm of W. S. Perdue & Son are extensive berry growers. They have 30 acres in strawberries and 20 acres in dewberries. There are many other growers having from 10 to 20 acres each. Wisconsin is one of the greatest fruit growing countries in the country, and the berry crop distributes thousand of dollars over the country.

Married Thirty-Four Times.

INDIANAPOLIS, IND., June 9.—Geo. Smith, colored, died at the reputed age of 105 years at the house of Capt. David Braden, who brought him from the South during the Civil War.

His earliest recollection was that when a child at Walls Ferry, Va., his master sold him for \$6. He said he was the body slave of Capt. Asa Brown, of Nashville, during the Mexican War and during the Civil War until his master was killed at the battle of Lebanon, Tenn.

The old man said he had been married 34 times and that he was the father of 52 children.
