Negroes Trunked Train. Two hundred trunked negroes, who had been left over at York, Pa., from a squad of 2,000 negroes, were trunked on the train for Maryland train for Porter, ending where the excursion train had been held for them. The negroes raised a panic on the train by cutting and running the train. The conductor was informed that the negroes intended to enforce the "Jim Crow" law in Pennsylvania. They saw several whites and proceeded to ride the car of them. The conductor stopped the car while the negroes fought, the latter compelling Dr. J. M. Decker, of Stoverston, and Edward Heines, of Spring Grove, to pass through the window. Dr. Heintz was forced to ride on the bumpers.

Two young women, Grace Oberlander and Florence Hersey, of Spring Grove, were ordered at the point of revolvers to ride on the engine with the engineer. Several of the negroes espied the women on the engine and they started to crowd the tender and put them off. The fireman drove the negroes back by firing his revolver at them. The negroes thereupon fired several volleys.

A number of the negroes were badly cut and bruised.

TALBOTT RENOMINATED.

Hon. J. Fred. C. Talbott is Nominated For Congress of the Second Congressional District.

The delegates from the counties of Baltimore, Harford and Carroll held the 15th and 16th wards of Baltimore city, comprising the Second Congressional District of Maryland met in the city of Westminster, Md., on June 27, and renominated for Congress Hon. J. Fredrick C. Talbott, of Baltimore county, by acclamation, he being the only nominee before the convention.

Mr. Talbott had no opposition, whatever, in the primary election, and the only day that he was nominated by the delegates to ratify the wishes of the Democratic voters expressed at the primary election.

A large number of persons in addition to the delegates from the districts arrived at Westminster, Wednesday morning, and after some preliminary conference, the delegates proceeded to present and the selection of officers of the convention at the Westminster Hotel.
