NEWPORT VIGNETTES.



If the girl in the moon should come to earth to see the very latest thing in fashionable apparel she would better come straight to Newport, for it is here, in the moon then, or any other member of her sex, can find valuable hints as to colors, materials, general lines, and the so-called minor details, that go to make up a really smart whole effect.

Shoes, gloves, parasols, belts, girdles and sashes or the innumerable little touches in draped veils, velvet dog collars, or those with jeweled clasps, serve to bring out the best points of the gown and its wearer. The mushroom hat, the one that has the brim drooping all around, the crown low, and the bandeaux underneath, shares with high crowned, flat rimmed shapes first place in fashionable favor.

Another Parisian fact that is in favor here is the toilette of Pekin stripes in black and white, or the same combination achieved in other ways. The new Helvetic silks that come only in black or white, but in a variety of weaves, satin, amure, or a particularly soft lustrous taffeta that wears as well as it looks, will be in great demand by the time society goes back to winter quarters.

Garments recently sent over from Paris are made up of these silks, and for colored satins L'Opin, Worth and others are using the soft, lustrous Sapho silks on account of their texture and exquisite coloring. A gown of this fabric worn at one of the small dinners that are Newport's favorite form of entertaining, was in one of the new reds that is exactly matched by the shade of a pink topaz. Another was in a soft yellow tone and the set of matching ornaments were made of yellow topaz and pearls.

Matching sets of semi precious stones, topaz, amethysts, aqua marines, olives and others of this class are made up into bracelets and necklaces, which are more often than not of the dog collar order. Cossage pins and various head ornaments (not tiaras), are as much of a fad for function dress as are matching parasols, hats, etc., for street attire.

Narragansett is very popular this season, and at the bathing hour on its beautiful beach, or dining in groups of intimates afterward in the pavilion, one recognizes many members of Newport's smartest contingent. As always, one sees the top notch of attractiveness in the bathing suits worn here. They vary from all black to pale pinks and baby blues, but the cut and trimmings are of the best, and where elaborate detailing is so general those who are not so conspicuous as they would seem in less ornate surroundings.

Whatever color may be selected, the favorite material for these suits is silk, usually taffeta, and if a grade made of pure silk is used, nothing is so satisfactory. This material does not cling or shrink, and holds its color as well as anything in the salt water. LUCY CARTER.

Maryland Affairs.

Washington, D. C., Aug. 18.—Last bulletin gave forecasts of disturbance to cross country. Expectations were raised to 21 to 25. Next disturbance will reach Pacific coast about 25, great central valleys 27 to 29, eastern states 29. Cool wave will cross west of Rockies about 28, great central valleys 29, eastern states 31.

August 18 was the last day for Sunday funerals, according to the edict of the Hack Drivers' Association. Exceptions will be made, however, in case of contagious diseases. Mr. John Gains, 47 years old, 1177 Crystal Place, Baltimore, died at the City Hospital shortly before noon Saturday from injuries sustained on an elevator accident at the factory of John C. Scherer, 15 Harrison street, eastern states September 1.

Scott Hartman, of Cretin, Garrett county, was stabbed in the right lung and seriously wounded on Saturday at Hattow, by Ward D. Stewart, the latter, it is alleged, having been crazed by drink. Sheriff Lee immediately went after Stewart and lodged him in jail at Oakland. Frederick Debold, 17 years old, son of Jno. Debold, of Harbaugh's Valley, Frederick county, who was shot in the chest, was seriously and instantly killed Edward Smith, and his father, who is charged with being an accessory to the crime, have made a statement of the murder to the attorneys.

Joseph Fay, 61 years old, 1342 North Fallow avenue, Baltimore, is at the Maryland Houseopathic Hospital, in a serious condition, suffering from a stab wound in his throat. The injury was inflicted with a pocket knife Saturday. According to Fay's statement, it was done by him with suicidal intent. While seeking to shield him from flying bullets, Mary Wynn, colored, 843 South Enoch street, Baltimore, was wounded, and her husband, James Williams, seriously injured, as the result of a gun going astray in the Third district of Annapolis county, near Solers Postoffice, Saturday night.

A veteran of the Civil War, bent with age, walked into the saloon of 1945, East Park street, Baltimore, early Saturday afternoon, sat down, removed his hat and died. From papers found on him, a serious condition, suffering from a stab wound in his throat. The injury was inflicted with a pocket knife Saturday. According to Fay's statement, it was done by him with suicidal intent.

William Jones, aged about 23 years, a fireman on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, while attempting to jump on the pilot of his engine at Brunswick, Frederick county, Sunday, fell beneath the wheels of the locomotive and had his left foot cut off at the ankle and his right foot badly mangled. He was brought to the Emergency Hospital in Frederick for treatment.

Suit has been filed in the Washington county court by Mrs. Mary Carter, who seeks a legal separation from her husband, L. Glad Barnhart. It is alleged that the complainant is only 16 years of age, and is unduly influenced by Barnhart; that the license was secured by fraudulent means by Barnhart on July 21; that 200 were secured, and that the complainant is now in the hands of the German Baptist Brethren Church, Hagertown; that the minister was under a misapprehension as to the age of the girl; that the couple lived together just five days and were then separated by the girl's father.

After having first come to her life by opening a water pipe he left with, presumably with a hat pin, Miss Henrietta Vollmer, 27 years old, committed suicide at her home, 316 Hanover street, Baltimore, by drinking about one and a half ounces of carbolic acid Sunday afternoon. Miss Vollmer suffered with spinal trouble and had been a hospital patient, though she was usually bright the day before. Mr. and Mrs. William C. H. Herke, her father, by sending a bullet through his head, Mr. Mason took his life while seated in an arm chair in the parlor of the club.

Milton Whitmore, aged 25 years, cashier of the Citizens' National Bank of Landford, Pa., was instantly killed and Daniel McGeehan, aged 27 years, assistant cashier of the same institution, was fatally injured late Sunday night when their carriage was struck by a trolley car.
