FRIDAY AFTERNOON, MARCH 1, 1907. JEROME BELIEVES THAW IS INSANE.

Laying Plans for a Lunacy Commission.

NEW YORK, February 23.—Counsel for Harry K. Thaw spent a good part of today denying the usual crop of recess rumors which spring up during every week-end adjournment of the trial.

Despite this, however, the belief grows that Mr. Jerome is continually pointing his efforts in that direction. He perhaps may have been influenced by the idea in making his cross-examination of Evelyn Thaw perhaps unnecessarily cruel when he was dwelling upon her intimate relations with Stanford White.

When the trial is resumed Monday Mr. Jerome will be armed with certain information placed in his hands by several chorus girls who were friends of White. The names of these girls were whispered to Mr. Jerome by Evelyn Nesbit to cause the District Attorney proceeded at once to secure statements from them.

It is now said that Mr. Jerome's idea was to build up from the testimony of these two physicians the groundwork for his application for a lunacy commission. The defense objected strenuously to the physicians taking the stand at this time, despite the fact that they were summoned from Pittsburgh in behalf of the defendant.

Mr. Jerome was so insistent that Drs. Deemar and Binghamman should be called that Justice Fitzgerald was led to inquire: "Are they your witnesses, Mr. District Attorney, or were they summoned by the defense?"

Mr. Jerome replied that their testimony was of such vital importance to the case that they might be his witnesses if the defendant's counsel were not willing to have them go upon the stand.

Some days ago Mr. Jerome was given permission to examine the two physicians in his office, the idea being that their testimony might be taken in the form of depositions. Evidently something occurred during the examination to cause the defense to take a new view of the matter.

The District Attorney in insisting that the doctors be heard declared that it was necessary for them to take the stand, at the introduction of depositions was not possible without the consent of the other side.

In his anxiety to introduce the testimony of the physicians last Thursday the prosecutor went to the extent of declaring that he had reason to believe that they were about to depart from the jurisdiction of the court. He further declared that under an opinion of the New York Court of Appeals it was impossible to extradite witnesses from another state, and though they had left this jurisdiction while under subpoena.

will show Evelyn Nesbit in a much more favorable light than she has been made to appear by the cruel cross examination of her.

Mr. Delmas, leading counsel for the defense of Harry Thaw, is so absolutely certain that Mr. Jerome committed a tactical error in not sparing the feelings of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw when she was on the witness stand, that when court convenes Monday morning Mr. Delmas will insist, should Mr. Jerome hesitate in delving deeper into the girl's past, that the District Attorney shall proceed upon the cross-examination and continue it until he has completely finished with the witness.

Mr. Delmas is of the opinion that the greater the cruelty of the girl's cross-examination the deeper will be the impression which the original story will leave upon the minds of the jury, and that thus the case of the defense is being strengthened with the repetition of the ordeal which drives all women from the courtroom.

There is no reason why Mr. Jerome should not continue his cross-examination of Evelyn Nesbit unless he is convinced that there are doubts of the present mental soundness of the defendant. So far as Mr. Delmas is concerned, Mr. Jerome must either take refuge in an application for a commission in lunacy, which the defense will strongly oppose, or he must continue to create such scenes in the courtroom as to make men weep and those in the jury box turn their faces in commiseration over the sorrows of the wife.

It will not be difficult, perhaps, for Mr. Jerome to tell all the secrets of her life when she testified on the witness stand in the long story which she repeated to her husband, and which, in the contention of the defense, served to intensify his abnormal mental condition. While these disclosures are most excruciating to Mr. and Mrs. Thaw, they do not cause the defense any apprehension as to the impression they must leave upon the final arbitrator, in determining facts, the 12 men in the jury box.

When the trial is resumed Monday Mr. Jerome will be armed with certain information placed in his hands by several chorus girls who were friends of White. The names of these girls were whispered to Mr. Jerome by Evelyn Nesbit to cause the District Attorney proceeded at once to secure statements from them.

They are both said to be extremely angry that their names were brought into the case, and, in the hearts of the jury, they will add a chapter to the sensational story which Mr. Jerome has brought out concerning the relations between Evelyn Nesbit and other men than White and Thaw. This will be added as a part of the general effort to discredit the defense's chief witness and make certain several days of great sensations in the coming week.

The effect of these sensations may be, as Mr. Delmas thinks they will be, sympathy in the hearts of the jury to the sympathies for the girl in her tribulation. In this view of the week's expected events, the coming week is likely to develop even greater sensations than have already taken place. Meanwhile, it may be stated that it is very unusual to find a jury of 12 men with hearts wholly impervious to the tears of a woman, especially if that woman happens to be unusually attractive and singularly childish and simple in appearance, and if this jury is impervious to the tears of Evelyn Nesbit, those of the mother on the stand are likely to be effective if the jury can be moved at all by a woman's suffering for another.

Clifford W. Hartridge, chief of counsel for Harry K. Thaw, declared today that Jerome was beaten. The lawyer issued an official statement touching upon the report that Mr. Jerome would ask for a commission to inquire into the insanity of Stanford White's lawyer. "If that suggestion came from the District Attorney's office," said Mr. Hartridge, "it is peculiar. I am using a mild word. Harry Thaw is certainly not any more insane than when the trial began. It would be a peculiar thing to do now when they are beaten."

Evelyn's pitiful narrative that the architect lured other young women and innocent girls to a fate the same as hers will be borne out by two other victims who have consented to take the witness stand for the defense. The statement was made today by one of the lawyers for the defense, who declared that no matter how grilling may be the District Attorney's cross-examination of the witness, if these two witnesses will substantiate every word she has said.
