### MR. CROUSE TO BE RE-ELECTED.

### His Re-Election As Insurance Commissioner To Be Unanimous.

Upon the expiration of his term of four years as state insurance commissioner, in December, Mr. B. F. Crouse will again be chosen for a term of four years by the Board of Public Works. His re-election will be unanimous. Governor Crothers and Treasurer Vandiver are said to have declared themselves favorable to him. Of course, Comptroller Hering the third member of the board, will support Mr. Crouse, who is a fellow-countian.

When Mr. Crouse was first elected commissioner, four years ago, he succeeded Mr. Lloyd Wilkinson, he received the votes of Comptroller Atkinson and of Treasurer Vandiver. Governor Warfield supported Mr. Joseph M. Street, of Harford county. The Governor moved to make Mr. Crouse's election unanimous.

At his first election Congressman Talbott supported Mr. Crouse. He will therefore urge the re-election of Mr. Crouse as insurance commissioner.

Take this one for an example; we venture to guess that what has been spent for hiring the Japanese costumes would have paid for the making of them. The association owning them you would not have to go to that expense when "The Mikado" is given, which we hope will be soon.

An opera house and a dramatic association, these two things we need, and remember, it's not what we want but what we need that we usually get.
