LA FOLLETTE.

Everybody who believes in honest Government should rejoice in the success of Senator LaFollette on Tuesday.

The doctrine preached by LaFollette is in reality Democratic doctrine as he stands for the interest of the many and against the avarice of the few.

It is apparent that the cause of protection is doomed. The West is aroused as it never has before, and with Roosevelt standing for Democratic doctrine, and Taft adopting them so far as State rights are concerned, it seems that the days of the G. O. P. are numbered.

ROOSEVELT'S WESTERN TRIP.

Just what Mr. Roosevelt is aiming to accomplish by his itinerary through the West, is a matter of conjecture.

He is so constituted that he must be doing something, and no man in the country has the faculty of keeping himself in the limelight so constantly as this intrepid Lion hunter.

There is one speech, however, that deserves special mention. This was delivered at the Conservation Congress, held in St. Paul, Minn., a few days ago.

This is in keeping with Roosevelt's ideas of the paramount control of the Federal Government in almost everything vital to the interests of the people of the country.

President Taft also made a speech at this same Congress. It was a calm, judicial, temperate utterance, just what would be expected of a man trained to respect the constitution of the country, and the rights of the states.

These speeches are direct opposites on the fundamental powers of the Federal Government, and after the Roosevelt hurra has over, we believe the calm thought of the American people, will justify President Taft's position and condemn that of Mr. Roosevelt.

Encouraged by the presence of the Governor, in full sympathy with them, the crowd gave full vent to its feeling and burnt a miniature toll-gate and house.

We can readily understand the people of that section of our State kicking up their heels in joy over the abolishment of tollgates. What we do not understand is why the Governor should have taken part in this manifestation of joy.

But one conclusion can be reached, and that is that the Hon. Austin L.

Crothers believes in destroying the toll-gates, and that he is in full accord with the schemes of his servant Tucker, who endeavors by threats to deplete the pikes and so get them for little money.

What are we coming to then when good people get excited over the burning of a miniature toll-gate? Is it that we are becoming socialistic? Can it be said that old Maryland, Maryland the home of freedom, believes in the destruction of private property? If so, then destroy our colors of orange and black and float in their stead the red flag of anarchism.

There is but one way to deal with pikes. Pay what they are worth or if you cannot agree upon the price, condemn and a jury can be trusted to do what is fair.

But it was a great day for Baltimore county. The only thing to mar the joy of the occasion was that no one knew how to roast the ox, so it was not killed. This was food for the ox and shows how we are deteriorating.
