

NEWS OF THE COMPASS.

Chancellor Allison decided at Nashville, Tenn., against the negro Knights of Pythias, holding that they have no right to the name, regalia, badges, etc.

Miss Georgia Smith, prominent in society at Rochester, N. Y., committed suicide Saturday evening at the Seneca Hotel by drinking carbolic acid.

Four arrests were made January 27 for an alleged felonious assault committed on Miss Laura Clifner, a well known woman, in Wilmington, Del., late Wednesday night.

Three men are dead and another was internally injured January 28 as a result of a premature dynamite explosion in the Helen Iron mine in the Michipicoten (Ontario) district.

Mrs. Nathan Kirkwood, of 392 Ripka street, Philadelphia, sentenced her husband Saturday to one year in the House of Correction, who was asked by the police captain to sentence her husband.

After having served eight years of a life sentence imposed for a murder he never committed, but of which he was convicted in Los Angeles, Severiano Gonzales has just been released from San Quentin prison.

Mrs. Sina Davis, 83 years old, was drowned January 29 in the Tyngs Valley River, between Bentons Ferry and Colfax, W. Va. The aged woman is supposed to have become bewildered and walked into the stream.

Just as he stepped from the pulpit, after preaching an eloquent sermon in the Presbyterian church, a man supposed to be the Rev. John Gibbs of Paterson, N. J., was arrested on a charge of horse setling at Tampa, Fla.

Mexisall, the first border town in Mexico to be captured by rebels, was taken with little resistance early Saturday. The only man killed was the jailer, when he refused to surrender his prisoners. The custom house was seized.

The body of Thomas Hedrick, 17 years old, who disappeared from his home in Princeton, W. Va., about a year ago, was found January 26 three-fourths of a mile northwest of the town in a badly decomposed condition.

The jury in the case of Laura Farnsworth Schenk, accused of poisoning her husband, John Q. Schenk, at Wheeling, W. Va., on January 26, who could not agree on a verdict was discharged. The jury stood 11 to 1 for acquittal.

The annual report and statistics for the corner's office shows that the cornerers acted last year in 5,408 deaths, a slight increase over 1909. Of these deaths 2,483 were of a violent nature, following wounds from assault or accidents.

With her skull crushed, supposedly by a flatiron, the body of Mrs. Oliver P. Smith was found January 25 in a rooming house owned by her. Two pocketbooks, both of which had been rifled, lay on the floor beside the corpse.

Wilhelmina Fouty, of Newark, W. Va., is dead from burns, her clothing having caught from an open grate in her room. She was alone, sitting in an invalid's chair, and the flames swept out and ignited her dress on January 26.

Federal indictments were returned at Guthrie, Okla., Saturday against Duke J. Jeffries, Democrat, and Willard Smith, Republican, both wealthy farmers, charging them with offenses against the franchise and against the civil rights of negroes.

John B. Hurt, 35 years old, a wealthy farmer living near Pounding Mill, Va., was found dead at 3 o'clock Friday morning on a ridge a short distance from his home with a bullet hole in his head and a revolver in his hand. Hurt had been in bad health for some time.

Four Italians working on the third track for the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, near Terr Alta, W. Va., were injured in a mysterious dynamite explosion on January 27. It is said the explosion was a Black Hand outrage, perpetrated by a Calabrian who had a grudge to settle with one of the men.

Elias White, whose name materially belies his color, enjoys the distinction of being the "biggest chicken thief in the world," according to County Constable Harrell, who brought him to jail at Suffolk, Va. White, says Harrell, has a record of 1,000 chickens collected at various times during his checkered career.

That the Chinese Government is ready to stamp out the plague epidemic was demonstrated January 25 when the Wai Pu Fu authorized Doctor Wu, in charge of the native city in Harbin, to burn 2,000 coffins containing corpses of plague victims, owing to the earth being frozen. These unburied bodies are believed to be contributing to the spread of the disease.

J. Burnett, a prominent European planter of Palaghat, on the Nellimpathy Hills, in Southern India, has been killed by an elephant under tragic circumstances. He was walking through his estate with one of his coolies, when an elephant chased them. They climbed a tree, but the infuriated beast dragged Mr. Burnett down and crushed him to death.

Twenty-three officers, noncommissioned officers and sailors, survivors of the Haytian gunboat Liberte, which sank at set off Port de Paix, Hayti, last October following an explosion, were tried January 27 by a military tribunal, charged with mutiny. They were found guilty of connection with the massacre of the admiral of the Liberte and several Haytien generals who were on board, and of burning the boat. All were condemned to death.

Following a pistol duel in the chair car of a Yazoo and Mississippi Valley train, in which A. Heron killed Chas. Stewart, the slayer terrorized the passengers until the train reached Hamburg, Miss., where he alighted, captured the town and held the inhabitants prisoners in their homes for 24 hours on Saturday. Then he stood off a posse until he could make his escape. A large posse with bloodhounds searched the country around Hamburg, but found no trace of the slayer.

More than 100 soldiers were killed in a three days' battle between the Mexican federal troops and insurgents in the mountains between Ojinaga and Cuchillo, Parrado, Mexico. The government troops were caught in a trap and literally mown down by the storm of bullets which swept their ranks from three directions. The insurgents occupied the cliffs and mountains and the soldiers were in the road with only one way of escaping and that blocked. Of the 200 men who went in the pass only 40 escaped so far as known.
