

NEWS OF THE COMPASS.

During the months of July, August and September last the number of persons killed in train accidents was 321, while 3,892 were injured.

Next week there will enter the police service of Barcelona 100 women, whose principal mission will be to aid in stamping out anarchy in that city.

Warrants are out February 3 for the arrest of eight men in connection with the disastrous dynamite explosion of Wednesday at Communipaw.

Fitzhugh Comer, 28 years old, shot and killed his sweetheart, Miss Cora Turner, 20 years old, February 2, and then killed himself at Naked Creek, Page county, Va.

The authorities and doctors continue to be puzzled as to the cause of the sneezing in a school of 40 girls taught by Miss Rosa Ernst in the northeastern section of Reading, Pa.

That the death due to famine and the pestilence following in its wake will total a million before spring, was the estimate submitted to the relief committee at Nanking, China, February 3.

On one of the three great railway systems in Western Canada five passenger and freight trains being buried in the snowdrifts, or at the mercy of dead locomotives.

Andrew Muzzleman, a farmer living near Greencastle, Pa., was struck by lightning and killed in the storm of mingled snow and hail which swept over Southern Pennsylvania late Friday night.

Abdul Hamid, the deposed Sultan of Turkey, killed two of his wives February 3 and was locked up in a cell, violently insane. His struggles are so violent that he has been put in irons, but he continually raves and moans.

Philip C. Felbuech, alias Feld, who was arrested in New Orleans two weeks ago on the request of the German government, charged with 287 forgeries in that country, committed suicide Monday in the parish prison.

J. Lyle Nugent, 21 years old, Philadelphia, was knocked unconscious when a tire of his automobile exploded on Sunday. He was removed to the Hahnemann Hospital, where it is said that he may lose the sight of both eyes.

Former Surrogate Petty, of Riverhead, N. Y., has presented his bill to the Suffolk County Mutual Insurance Company for legal services rendered during the fiscal year ended on February 3 of last week. The bill is for \$5 cents.

Mrs. Carrie Nation, who became famous throughout the country several years ago by reason of her fondness for smashing saloons, was reported to be sinking rapidly Monday, at Eureka Springs, Ark., and her death is said to be imminent.

McConnellsburg, the county seat of Fulton county, about 20 miles above Hancock, was visited by a fire which destroyed four buildings, a barn and icehouse, and a new automobile on which was carried \$1,000 insurance.

Sharks delayed the progress of the Royal Mail steamer Marima, which arrived at Port Limon, Porto Rico last week. For three days she drifted idle and helpless because of a school of about 20 man-eaters which hovered about her stern.

A murderer, four highwaymen, five burglars, two forgers and three ordinary citizens sat down Friday night at a banquet in a prominent hotel at Los Angeles, Cal., as guests of Leonard Mordant, himself an ex-convict, who is now at the head of the prison page fund of the Union Rescue Mission.

Albert Barlow, of Galveston, Texas, a convict who is working on a six-months' sentence, was taken sick February 3 and sent to a hospital, where it was necessary to perform a surgical operation to locate the trouble. A diamond valued at \$300 and weighing over a carat was taken from his stomach.

Barlow Bolton, a farmer 47 years old, is said to be dying at his home on Clinch river, in Scott county, Virginia, as the result of having been shot through a window of his home by a would-be assassin last week. Both barrels of the shotgun were emptied into his body. There is no clue to the assassin.

Sister Mary of the Rosary will look upon the face of her father Sunday for the first time in thirty years at the Convent of the Good Shepherd at Brooklyn, N. Y. At rare intervals the nun had heard his voice through the darkened grating of a convent window, but her vows prevented her from seeing his features.

Eight negro convicts escaped from the workhouse in Prince William county, Va., February 2 and 117 more were prevented from getting away only by the repeating rifles of the guards, when the 125 made a concerted effort to gain their freedom by carrying stones into the prison concealed in their clothing for use of weapons.

The board of managers of the Maryland Tuberculosis Sanatorium at Sabillville at a meeting last Friday in Baltimore and approved plans for the erection of an additional hospital building which will accommodate about 200 patients. The building will contain quarters for the doctors, nurses and other help, offices, kitchen and dining room.

Seven-year-old Thomas Kennedy died early February 3, in Brooklyn, N. Y., from a bullet wound. Five-year-old Joseph Britton is in a critical condition as the result of a wound made by the same bullet. Locked up in the Children's Society is a terrified 11-year-old girl, Marian Riddle, who was accused by the police of having fired the fatal shot.

Opening a pimple on the left leg of her year-old son, Mrs. Bruce Embley, of Waynesboro, Pa., discovered the end of a needle, which she pulled from the flesh. The needle was an inch and a half long. It is believed that the child swallowed the needle some time ago, and the tiny piece of steel must have passed through the stomach and intestines and worked out through the flesh.

Many natives were drowned by a tidal wave which followed the eruption of the volcano Taal and subsequent earthquakes, according to press advices received at Manila, F. I., January 30. Part of the island sunk five feet. An American school teacher who has traversed the west shore of Lake Taal telegraphs that five small villages were destroyed by the tidal wave, and that not less than 300 persons have been killed in that vicinity.

Many were burned in fires started by molten masses. All the towns within a radius of fully 20 miles have suffered damages from the rain of mud and stones.

MARYLAND HAPPENINGS.

The dwelling on the Pierce lands, 2 miles northwest of Easton, occupied by W.J. Sowers, was destroyed by fire with all the contents on Friday last.

As a result of injuries suffered by being struck by an electric car at Rockville on the evening of December 10, Henry Bradley, a wealthy citizen of Rockville, is dead.

Crisfield is very much worked up over the shooting of Claude Fox, a young man of Crisfield, by Jailkeeper "Al" Holland, of Princess Anne, which occurred Sunday afternoon in Crisfield.

Harry Schultz, who recently married Miss Hannah Woodrow, near Rising Sun, has been sued by a Fairfield (Lancaster county) girl for \$3,000, who alleges desertion at the marriage altar.

Ernest Ruble, aged 18 years, employed at Byron's tannery, Williams port, got his hand caught in a 25-ton power press on last Friday. It was so badly crushed that amputation was found necessary.

Out of work and tired of life, Edward Everett Hurdle, 21 years old, of Baltimore, attempted suicide in Horn & Horn's restaurant, on Market St., Philadelphia, on February 3 by shooting himself behind the right ear.

Wildcats are so numerous and so fierce in Garrett county this year that in some sections it is not safe to venture out on the county roads after dark. The cold weather and deep snow have made foraging difficult and the cats are hungry.

The rural mail delivery in Talbot county has reached large proportions. Some of the carriers from Eastport, off the coast, and deliver during a month between 25,000 and 30,000 pieces of mail matter, while others handle from 10,000 to 20,000 pieces.

Making up a freight train at Bayview Junction, Baltimore, Friday night, John Riley, 64 years old, of Philadelphia, a conductor in the employ of the Pennsylvania Railroad, was knocked down by a shifting engine which passed over his body and killed him.

Mrs. Elizabeth Stewart, 65 years old, of Eastport, is dead from burns she sustained two weeks ago. She was preparing breakfast over a gasoline stove at the time of the accident. There was a leakage and the fluid on the floor getting ablaze caught her clothing.

Seventeen cattle out of a herd of 23 belonging to Mr. E. D. De Laughter, near Frederick, were killed last Friday morning under the direction of Dr. W. G. Benner, an expert from the Bureau of Animal Industry, Washington. The cattle were tuberculin tested several days ago and the result of the test indicated infection.

Three fires within a week, the last of which resulted in the destruction of Fairview Seminary on Saturday night, have left the residents of Gethersburg to believe that a firebug is working in the town. The Fairview Seminary had not been occupied for about four months, but was furnished throughout, and the loss was about \$9000.

On her way downstairs before daylight Monday morning to prepare her husband's breakfast, Mrs. Dorothy Riordan, a resident of Gethersburg, of her home, 1017 Forrest street, Baltimore, and the lighted lamp she was carrying crashed to the floor. The blazing oil splattered over her clothing, and in a second she was one mass of flames. Before they were extinguished the woman had died.

A mass of charred and smoldering ruins is all that remains of the tin-plate superstructure of offices and tower on the new pier of the Baltimore Steam Packet Company (Old Bay Line), Light-street wharf, Baltimore, which was destroyed by fire early last Friday morning. The fire was discovered shortly after 2 o'clock. The damages, say officials of the Company, will not exceed \$50,000.

Reports to the Maryland Agricultural College from the National Corn Show which was in progress at Columbus, Ohio, are to effect that Maryland won first honors. In the world's class Maryland carried off first prize for buckwheat and in the same class, in which the various States competed, first prize on white corn, wheat, rye, oats and barley and also second prize in the zone class for yellow corn. Second and third prizes for the world's class on cowpeas also went to this State.

Early Trainings. It is woman's duty to look well to the care of the household. To do this she must have sound mind in a sound body. She must be trained and educated from infancy with this aim constantly before her. Her mother should go to her play house and teach her how to arrange it nicely. Get her trunk and see that she keeps her things well arranged in it. Give her a place for her playthings. Then see that others do not molest them. When she is older, give her a room to keep tidy. Also have her to help do any and every kind of household work. Tell her of your aim. Explain that it is all for her own good in the future. When she is twelve, go visiting and let her see how much there is to do, and how well she can manage it.

Some girls are discouraged after marriage find so much more to do than they anticipated. Worse still to find themselves so ignorant how to do. Explain that there is real pleasure in doing most any kind of work after we learn how. That after she is married, she will neither have time to learn nor have a teacher. That she must have pride of character, self-control, self-reliance, and self-dependence. Reaching her aim depends on her own effort. That she must make herself do the right thing at the right time in the right way.

Urge her to take care of her health, to be in bed early. To be temperate in all things. To cultivate and practice good morals and gentle manners for the sake of her influence on others. To practice eating, walking, talking, etc., at home as though she was abroad. Because practice makes perfect, and because repetition forms habits and habits are second nature.

In short, see that she marshals all her forces to reach her aim. When it can be truly said of her that she is useful as well as ornamental, and that she has a good practice, all-round education, her mother has looked well to the ways of one of her household. Our opinion is that all this cannot be accomplished in less than twenty years. That a girl is not capable of looking well to the ways of her household younger than this.

At twenty the girl is not capable of making her own choice. If her husband takes a wrong view or wrong aim she can reason him into right by gentle, patient perseverance.—Ellicott City Times.
