

NEWS OF THE COMPASS.

Sentence of death was passed Friday night upon William Furber, a negro charged with committing an assault upon Miss Flora Anglin, a white woman, on December 24 at Weston, W. Va.

The body of Joseph Powell, 35 years old, was found February 12 in a ditch on the Johnson farm, between Red Lion and St. Georges, Del. He was employed on the farm and had been missing for a week.

W. W. Handlin, an aged and eccentric lawyer, of New Orleans, La., who died several days ago, left a will disposing of his property and the last sentence was: "I wish to be buried face downward."

Ten shop employees of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railroad were torn to fragments and seven others were injured February 8 when an engine under repair exploded in the Smithville (Texas) yards. Besides the loss of life, railroad property valued at \$20,000 was destroyed.

Mrs. Roberta Garrett Menges-Corwin-Hill was fined \$2,000 and sentenced to three days in the Tombs Prison by Judge Martin, of the United States Circuit Court, on Saturday, for smuggling into the country a sable coat and jewelry valued at about \$8,000. She is the first woman to be given a jail sentence on this charge in New York.

Miss Maude West, daughter of Christopher West, of Roanoke, Va., was instantly killed with a shotgun Monday afternoon by J. W. Powell, a young man who had been paying her attentions. He fired both charges into her breast and right arm, then, reloading, placed the gun to his head and blew out his brains, falling dead beside the girl.

Seven foreigners were run down by a fast freight train on the Western Maryland railroad at Thomas, W. Va., Friday night and the bodies of three are at the morgue there. The men stopped out of the way of one train directly in front of another, the approach of which they had failed to observe. All were Poles or Lithuanians, and mine employees.

The explosion of blasting powder at the E. I. Dupont mill at Pompton, N. J., Monday cost the lives of two men, Charles Howard and John Demarest. They were the only workmen in the building at the time of the accident. Howard was blown through the side of the frame building and landed against a pile of rocks. His body was horribly mangled. Demarest's body was not badly torn.

MARYLAND HAPPENINGS.

Thelma, the 7-year-old daughter of Dr. and Mrs. L. R. Hamrick, of North East, died Monday morning from burns received Friday night while playing around a stove from which she caught fire.

Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Kahmer, 25 years old, wife of Mr. Philip Kahmer, of Baltimore, ended her life shortly after 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon by swallowing the contents of a 2-ounce vial of tartaric acid.

Arthur Allen, the 14-year-old son of Thomas Allen, of Frederick, who ran away from home last May and shipped to West Africa, returned home February 9 to the joy of his father, who was searching long for him.

Despondent over his ill health, Albert Frederick Necker, of Baltimore, committed suicide Saturday morning by shooting himself through the heart. Necker was 29 years old and had been sick in bed with stomach trouble.

While David H. Hartsock, a Baltimore and Ohio railroad brakeman, of Brunswick, was leaning out of the window of a caboose Friday his head struck a water tank near Orleans, a short distance beyond Cumberland, and he was instantly killed.

While working with a gang of Italians Saturday morning on the track of the Pennsylvania Railroad, near Middle Street Station, Baltimore, Vincenzo Di Pietro, was struck by an engine of a southbound express train and received injuries from which he died.

Mr. and Mrs. Max Windhausen, of Arlington avenue, Govans, had a narrow escape from death in a fire which broke out shortly after 1 o'clock Sunday morning and destroyed their home and all of their household effects, with the exception of a few pieces of parlor furniture.

Miss Daisy Ledane, of Cumberland, the accomplished blind girl whose case of hysterical coma has interested the Cumberland medical fraternity for the past few days, she having fallen down a flight of steps on February 1 and remained in an unconscious condition ever since, died Monday at noon.

Mrs. Bessie Nelson, aged 20 years, who with her husband, Frank Nelson, aged 30 years, was found unconscious from gas poisoning in a little room on the third floor of 114 East Franklin street, Baltimore, died late Sunday afternoon at the Mercy Hospital from the effects of the gas poisoning. Her husband, lying in a semi-conscious condition in an adjoining ward, was not informed of his wife's death, for his condition was critical.

Aged John Switzer, Austrian and Spanish veteran, soldier of fortune, of Cumberland, protected his home against Sheriff Hendley February 9, shot the Sheriff, tried to shoot Walter Clay, a deputy, and was mortally wounded by Clay. He died at 9:30 o'clock the same night. Sheriff Hendley was shot in the hand and breast. His worst injury is to his hand, which was shot through the little finger. Only a flesh wound was made in his breast.

The mystery surrounding the destruction by fire of Summit Heights Hotel, at Gaithersburg, about midnight, January 28, was cleared up Monday by the arrest and confession of Chas. W. Saffel, a well-known young resident of Gaithersburg. The arrest followed a two-hour investigation Monday morning by State Fire Marshal Ewell and Detective Kratz, of Baltimore, and within a very few minutes after he was formally charged with the crime, Saffel acknowledged his guilt and made a clean breast of the whole affair.
