Announcement was made by officials of the Western Maryland Railway Company that they are in the market for new equipment and motive power for the new Cumberland extension which will be completed in the fall. Specifications for 500 steel hopper cars, a number of passenger cars and 40 locomotives have been sent out and the contract is expected to be awarded within the next few weeks.

LOCAL AFFAIRS.

J. Frank Diffendal leaves tomorrow for a three months trip through the South on business. During the past seven years, Dr. A. W. Grabill, of Johnsville, has dehorned 9,934 head of cattle. Rev. Ronalds Taylor will occupy the pulpit in Grace Lutheran Church, this city, Sunday morning next, at 10:30 o'clock. The 4.15 p. m., train was delayed 1 hour and 20 minutes yesterday at Smithburg on account of its engine breaking down. Mrs. Carrie V. Robertson filed a bill for a divorce from her husband, Jesse Robertson, in the Circuit Court for Carroll County, on February 10, both reside in this county. Herman Taylor, aged 18 years, of Silver Run, who is visiting the family of Charles Bechtel, near Swartz's school-house, went to Hanover on Monday afternoon on Mr. Bechtel's four-horse wagon. When returning home in the evening, the lad accidentally fell from the wagon, and his head and neck were struck by the hind wheels passing over his body. The body was badly bruised but no bones broken. It has been decided to locate the main shops of the Western Maryland Railway at Cumberland, according to a statement of Industrial Commissioner Austin Gallagher. The location, it is understood, will be at Kidgey, on the West Virginia side of the Potomac river, where the division shops now are, though a site at Cumberland race track, on the Maryland side, is said to have been under consideration. A remarkable story is told of the formation of a stone in the bowels of a horse owned by R. Lee Myers, of Linwood, which died a few days ago. The animal suffered intensely and could not bear to be approached. From a gentle creature it became vicious and was eventually crazed with pain. After its death Dr. A. E. Lambert, of New Windsor, veterinary surgeon, found in its bowels a stone six inches long, four inches in diameter and weighing two and a half pounds. It had a rough and uneven surface. John Schaefer, a farmer, who died two weeks ago at his home, near Eastview, left a will, in which he devised \$200 to the German Evangelical Trinity Lutheran Church, on the Deer Park road. From his personal estate he devised \$2,200 to various persons, in sums of \$100 to \$300, and named the devisees of his real estate. The residue of his estate he bequeathed to the Evangelical Association of the Annapolis Home for Orphans and Aged, in Baltimore. His personal estate, of which the residue will be part, is between \$5,000 and \$4,000. Mr. Schaefer was a native of Germany, but had resided in this county many years. His will has been admitted to probate in the Orphans' Court.

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
