EVERY DEMOCRAT SHOULD VOTE AT THE COMING PRIMARY ELECTION.

On Tuesday, the 29th of the present month, the Primaries will be held, under the new Primary Election law, for the purpose of determining who shall be the candidates of the respective political parties, to be voted for at the General Election in November, next.

We are especially anxious that the Democrats of Carroll county shall turn out in full force, both at the Primary and at the succeeding General Election. The object of the Primary Election law is that the members of each of the political parties shall, by their choice, determine who their candidates shall be.

Miss Caroline E. Wilson, of Baltimore, is much pleased with the progress of woman suffrage in Maryland. "Outside of Baltimore," she said, "Frederick is the stronghold of woman suffrage in the State. There are several organizations in the county. Almost all the men suffragists at the Taneytown Fair were from Frederick county. I am sure Maryland women will have suffrage in five years at the longest. In fact, suffrage sentiment is stronger in Maryland than in any other Eastern State."

A table of statistics recently compiled by Clarence J. Owens, based on the reports of the Bureau of Census, United States Department of Commerce and Labor, shows that farm lands throughout sixteen states of the South have greatly increased in value since 1900.
