New Cars for Western Maryland.

The Western Maryland Railway Company has received as a part of its new equipment for the opening of the Pittsburgh extension 15 of the latest passenger coaches, combination mail and express and baggage cars. These have been put in immediate service to relieve the enormous excursion and mountain travel traffic.
The new cars are 60 feet long, 9 feet 8 inches wide and have a seating capacity of 70 persons each—10 more than regulation passenger coaches of even modern construction. They are built on the most improved plan of steel underframe, with anti-telescoping device, which makes a bad wreck almost an impossibility and adds to the safety of passengers.

HE REPORTS PROGRESS.

General Manager of W. M. Takes a Trip Over the New Extension.

General Manager J. A. Shepherd, of the Western Maryland Railway, has just returned from an inspection trip over the new extension between Cumberland and Connellsville, and he says that excellent progress is being made by the Carter Construction Co. Mr. Shepherd declared that practically all the trouble experienced at the Big Savage Tunnel, due to the discovery of a quicksand bed, had about been removed.
The contractors, he said, would soon put in operation a machine which is capable of laying two miles of railroad track per day. About five miles of track have so far been laid, including a portion of the double-track stretch, extending about two miles outside of Cumberland.
