LOCAL AFFAIRS. The new Republican paper to be started in this city by the Mather Printing Co., will make its first appearance the middle of September.

The Western Maryland Railroad Co. has started work on the new cement curb and platform which will extend from Green to Main streets.

Orders were received on Thursday last week to shut down all departments in the Western Maryland Railway shops on the line till September 1.

The Teacher's Institute will be held in this city beginning Monday, September 11. The public schools will open the following Monday, September 18.

The Agricultural Society of Montgomery county will hold a county fair at Rockville, on August 29, 30, 31, and September 1. There is a half-mile race track, and purses and premiums to the amount of \$10,000 will be offered.

On Monday evening in Belle Grove square there will be an open air meeting held in the interests of Woman suffrage. Addresses will be made by Dr. Donald R. Hooper and Miss Louise Frazee, of Baltimore. H. P. Gorsuch, of this city, will preside.

Capt James T. Long, author of the "Red Book," and internationally renowned as a Gettysburg battlefield lecturer, died last Sunday night after an illness of several weeks caused by the bursting of a blood vessel. He was well known to many people in this city.

The County Commissioners permitted the Court House to be used for the Blair Lee meeting last Tuesday and will permit either the Democrats or Republicans to use it during the campaign, owing to the fact that Odd Fellows' Hall has been closed for improvement.

A meeting was held at the Court House Tuesday evening in the advocacy of the candidacy of Senator Blair Lee. General T. Herbert Shriver presided, and music was furnished by the First Regiment band. Senator Lee and Ex-Governor Warfield were the speakers.


