KILLED BY BLUE MOUNTAIN EXPRESS.

William Dayhoff Meets Instantaneous Death at Keymar.

Struck by the engine of the Blue Mountain express, bound for Pen-Mar Monday morning, William Dayhoff, 26, foreman of the Western Maryland Railway, was killed instantly within a few hundred yards of his home, at Keymar.

According to eyewitnesses of the accident, Mr. Dayhoff was sitting on the top of a cross-tie watching one of the cows, which was grazing near the tracks. The train, laden with about a carload of sheep, turned a sharp curve in the road a few yards from where he was sitting, and as it sped over him the cylinder-head of the locomotive struck Mr. Dayhoff, crushing his head.

The engine crew brought the train to a quick stop and went back to where the man was lying in a pool of blood by the side of the tracks. When they reached his side life was extinct. They lifted him hurriedly and carried him to the station at Keymar, from whence his body was later taken to his home in the little village.

SUFFRAGISTS IN CARROLL.

Over the County and Hold Meetings in Taneytown and Westminster.

A party of Baltimore suffragists invaded this county on Monday and held meetings in Taneytown at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, in the Court house with Dr. Seth D. Downie, pastor of Taneytown Presbyterian Church, presiding; also they held an open-air meeting in Belle Grove Square, this afternoon, at eight o'clock in the evening.

Dr. G. G. Gorsch presided, at the meeting held here, which however, was attended by a small crowd, as Westminster women are not very enthusiastic in the suffrage question.

Addresses were made by Dr. Downie, R. Hooker and Miss Louise Frazier, both of Baltimore.

The trip was made in Dr. Hooker's touring car. Accompanying Dr. Hooker were Miss Caroline Wilson, Miss Louise Frazier, Mrs. Frank F. Lewis, Miss Annette Beveridge and Mrs. Warren H. Lewis.

Colorful suffrage fans and paper bag dodgers, pleading for the suffrage cause, were distributed along the route.

LINCOLN HIGHWAY WILL COME.

Congressman Lefean Says Bill Will Pass the Next Session.

The Gettysburg Times publishes an address made by Congressman Lefean at the Hotel Gettysburg, Monday night, at a banquet given him under the direction of the Retail Merchants' Association, following the breaking of ground for the federal building in Gettysburg.

After discussing several other matters Mr. Lefean took up the possibilities of the Lincoln Way project. "The Lincoln Way is now more of a possibility than ever before," he said, "before the close of the second session of the Sixty-Second Congress—and I measure my words—you will find the passage of the bill creating the Lincoln Way. When I first introduced the project five years ago it had few supporters—people thought the idea too gigantic—but now all is changed. On the one side we have the Grand Army and on the other the good roads advocates all working for the Lincoln Way. Speak of Grand Army, a strong opponent of the project told me within the last few weeks that he now favors it."

"This summer a systematic campaign will be carried on in every State in the Union for the Lincoln Way. Every section will be flooded with literature bearing on the subject and no congressman will dare go back to Washington in December and vote against the bill."

Mr. Lefean said that when the report of the commission appointed to submit a design for a fitting Lincoln memorial in Washington would be made in December and a bill drafted, the bill presented would carry an amendment providing that such memorial be the entrance to the Lincoln Way. The most vigorous applause of the evening greeted Mr. Lefean's remarks and the banquet ended with three cheers for Congressman Lefean and three more for the Lincoln Way.

SUE THEIR MOTHER-IN-LAW.

Three Sons-in-Law of Mrs. Elizabeth Alexander Ask for Settlement.

To settle a dispute between Mrs. Elizabeth Baumgardner and her sons-in-law, Wm. A. Sappington, Henry Lowman and Reuben Alexander, testimony has been taken in the circuit court.

Mrs. Baumgardner is the widow of Bartholemew Baumgardner and lives near Mt. Airy. Her husband owned a farm of about 160 acres in the neighborhood of West Falls, near Mt. Airy, in which Mrs. Baumgardner held lower rights. The property was sold under a decree of the court, subject to her dower right. The purchasers were her sons-in-law who wanted to purchase her interest. However, they could not agree on the price and the men applied to the court for the appointment of a commission to determine the satisfactory price.

The proceedings have stirred up a fuss between the men and their mother-in-law who says that she formerly had three sons-in-law but now she has none.—Frederick News.
