Indianapolis Auto Races.

Shown at Pioneer Theatre
Tonight and Saturday
Night.
The Essanay Film Manufacturing Company is fortunate. The recent automobile race in Indianapolis, Ind., which was filmed by the Essanay Company, will probably not be repeated, as the manufacturers of automobiles are reported to have said that such a race, 500 miles long, is too trying for both cars and drivers.

The day on which this race was held was cloudless and clear, being ideal conditions for the making of pictures, and it is reported that the pictures of the race caught by the Essanay cameras are remarkably good. Twelve cameras were used in the making of these pictures and they covered nearly every portion of the track, which is circular and of about a mile in diameter, with 200 lays to the 500 miles.

The first picture gives views of the grandstands and scenes about the 100,000 strong, who viewed the race. Then "Bob" Burman in his famous Blitzen Benz is shown being crowned Speed King shortly after he broke the mile record in 35:35. Then he broke the grandstand we see the drivers and the cars entered for the long race, also closer views of the same. Then we see these cars lined up at the tape ready to start. The start on the preliminary lap, accompanied by the president of the Essanay camera, after that the start of the real race and the dash down the home stretch.

Then follow views showing cars as they pass different points along the track. Also several views of minor mishaps to cars, such as throwing tires are shown; and with these the making of repairs at the repair pits opposite to the grandstand. One view shows a tire leaving a wheel and rolling for a quarter of a mile up the stretch. The tire disappears by bounding over a wall.

The worst accident of the day happened in front of the grandstand, a few feet from the Essanay camera. In this three cars were wrecked and five men injured. A complete picture of this was recorded, and its cause, the breaking of the front axle on the Case "8" driven by Joe Jagersburger, Anderson, the mechanic, was thrown out and the car swung in front of the Westcott "7", driven by Harry Knight.

Among other scenes we see Harroun in the Marmon Wasp flash by the creckered flag of the starter, which informed him that he was the victor in the great race. Then we see closer views of Harroun and his car, and the film with a new view of the scoreboard showing the time and the distances run of each of the cars.
