OUR EDUCATIONAL EQUIPMENT.

The opening of the public schools throughout the county on Monday marked the end of vacation days for the boys and girls of this community.

Our East End High School, with an enrollment of 392 pupils, with teachers enthusiastic for work after last week's Institute of instruction, and with a well equipped Domestic Science Department, gives promise of a banner year in its history. Those who graduate from this school are well prepared either to enter college or to knuckle down as wage earners.

In the West End School 150 pupils have been enrolled up to date.

There is everywhere a demand for young men and women who are well informed and who by a High School or College course have cultivated the habit of thinking out things for themselves. How much better is such a young man or woman fitted to battle with life's struggles than one who has not cared to get an education.

No one living in the vicinity of Westminster has any excuse for not getting a good education. In addition to our fine public schools we have the great advantage of a splendidly equipped institution of learning in our midst. Western Maryland College opened for the collegiate year on Wednesday. Here young people of limited means can secure a liberal and thorough education in a school that is unsurpassed by any other institution of its kind in the State, with its competent faculty, large library and high standard of scholarship.

Everyone owes himself the very best education he can get and there are not many places the size of Westminster where such fine opportunities are afforded.

HOW ABOUT THAT?

In its columns last week our neighbor said "The people of Maryland will not suffer another Gorman." "No more Frances Arthur or Poe." How about that?

The white Republicans of Maryland know very well that they cannot elect a governor. That is always admitted. Then if a Republican governor is elected, the negroes will have to do it. If Gorman is elected white people will elect him. Should Maryland be governed by white people or by negroes? How about that? White people, all the time! Then Gorman will be the next governor. White people will take care of their own property, their homes and wives and children, rather than allow the negro to say how the State shall be governed.

Many of the white Republicans of Maryland believe that we are protected better when white people govern the State. This is a position that cannot be attacked, because it is the truth.

THE AUTOMOBILE.

This class of vehicle, which is of modern origin, and has only within the past few years been introduced to the public, is a very attractive and popular machine, and is used largely for pleasure and for business.

As a means of rapid travel, it surpasses anything that has been invented, except the Steam Railroad Locomotive. It is a machine of tremendous power and speed, and because of this is fraught with the greatest danger, if not handled by those who understand it, and who are careful in its use.

A long list of fatalities is chargeable to the Automobile, since its introduction. Only within the past few days, at Syracuse, N. Y., a racing machine got from under the control of the driver and killed seven persons and seriously injured twice as many more. Almost every daily newspaper records each day the death of some one killed in an Automobile accident.

The trouble about it is this, every one thinks he is competent to run an Automobile. It looks so easy, and is so fascinating. And especially is this so with the young,—full of enthusiasm, but without experience or training,—just let her go, the machine running the driver, rather than the driver running the machine. If all happens to go right, well, if not then the coroner and the undertaker.

While the Automobile has come to stay, and is a machine susceptible of great usefulness and pleasure, the community is coming to believe that the dangerous features must be reduced or wholly eliminated, if not by the Automobillists themselves, then by the law of public safety.

Certainly there must be a take-up in the matter at some point. Nothing else so dangerous would be allowed to run at large in the community. And so, legal limitations must be enforced against reckless speeding, and against the handling of machines by inexperienced and incompetent drivers. The Automobillists must recognize this, or public sentiment will require it to be done by law.

DEMOCRATIC STATE CANDIDATES NOTIFIED.

At Fairview, the beautiful home of Senator Gorman, in Howard county, on Tuesday last, the official notification of the Democratic State candidates took place. There was a very large gathering of prominent Democrats from various sections of the State, and the occasion was one of much enthusiasm.

Senator Gorman, our candidate for Governor, made a most happy and forcible speech, in which he placed himself squarely upon the Democratic platform, pledging himself to all the policies for which the Democratic party stands in the present campaign. There were present many of the ardent supporters of Senator Lee, in the recent Primary, all thoroughly working for the success of the State ticket.

The party enters the campaign, united all over the State, and with confidence of success at the November election. Every Democrat, however, must rally to the standard of his party.

WHO IS THE BOSS?

"Is there one intelligent independent voter in Maryland who can truthfully say that Phillips Lee Goldsborough is not the candidate of a solid Republican machine organization, selected by the acknowledged, undisputed boss and dictator of the Republican party of Maryland, the Hon. William F. Stone, Collector of the Port of Baltimore? Will anyone assert that the Republicans were called together in the several counties of the State, or even the city of Baltimore and consulted as to their preference for the gubernatorial nomination? I will not even consider the candidacy of any other parties. I will not consent that even a primary shall be held to ascertain the wishes of the common people as to who shall lead us in the coming contest, but I will decide the question myself. In fact, I have decided it. I know it all and Phillips Lee Goldsborough shall be the candidate."—J. S. B. in Baltimore Sun.

Senator Gorman was selected at the Primaries by the citizens of Maryland who freely voted that he should be their standard bearer for Governor.

The harmony and good feeling that marked the gathering of Democrats at Senator Gorman's home on Tuesday, the handshakes and expressions of good fellowship were most gratifying to the rank and file of the party.

The Republican nominees were notified of their nomination by a number of prominent party men last week at Cambridge, but we failed to see the name of Brother Cummings, colored, mentioned.

If the whole country goes as Maine did in the constitutional referendum it will be a long time in finding out what it did to itself.
