##### Killed By Locomotive.

Rev. William Anthony, a Methodist Episcopal minister, who for the past two years has been pastor of the congregations at Doubts, Point of Rocks, Jefferson and Middletown, in Frederick county, was killed Sunday afternoon by being struck by the tender of a locomotive on the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, near Doubts.  
Seeing a train approaching on the track on which he was walking, he stepped over to the adjoining track, which a locomotive was running backward to Washington Junction. The tender struck him in the back and he was killed instantly, his skull being fractured.  
Mr. Anthony, who was a native of Baltimore, was about 50 years of age. He had been a member of the Baltimore Methodist Episcopal Conference for a number of years. He went to Frederick county two years ago from Elk Garden, W. Va. His wife, who was Miss McKinstry, of McKinstry's, this county, and two children survive him.

## VICTIM OF FOOTBALL.

### YOUNG MERRYMAN DIES FROM INJURIES RECEIVED ON SATURDAY.

In last Saturday's football game between Western Maryland and Davis-Elkins, on the college field, this city, Walter E. Merryman, of Wellsburg, W. Va., a sophomore at Davis-Elkins College and a star half back on its football team, received injuries which resulted in his death on Monday night. The young man was injured within a few minutes of the close of the fourth quarter, the back of his head striking the ground with a thud and causing a hemorrhage of the brain. While carrying the ball he was tackled by a Western Maryland player. When picked up he was conscious for a few moments, but soon sank into a state of coma from which he did not revive.

After a consultation of physicians, the young athlete was put on a Western Maryland train Saturday evening and taken to the Union Protestant Infirmary, Baltimore, where he was operated on by Dr. Dunott. The hospital physicians gave no hope of his recovery and he died Monday night. His mother and several relatives were at his bedside. The body was taken to the home of his father, where funeral services were held.

Resolutions of regret over the death of young Merryman were adopted by the Western Maryland College faculty and sent to Merryman's parents and to Davis-Elkins College.

One who witnessed the game on Saturday stated that while Merryman had played an excellent game, he did not seem to be in very good physical condition and the coach of the Davis-Elkins team, said he had noticed throughout the season that Merryman seemed to possess an aptitude for the game, but he had constantly urged upon him the necessity of using precautionary methods to protect himself.

## DEATH OF REV. E. H. C. GOODWIN

### Former Rector of Ascension Church, this City.

Rev. Edward H. Carmichael Goodwin, one of the oldest and most beloved ministers of the Protestant Episcopal Church, died at his home in Glyndon Wednesday morning, October 18. Death was due to pneumonia. The funeral will be held in All Saints' church, Glyndon, today at 3 p. m., and will be conducted by Rev. J. Fletcher who will conduct the services, and burial will be in All Saints' Cemetery.

Rev. Goodwin was 84 years old and for nearly 60 years had ministered to the wants of the people of his denomination, both in Maryland and New York, where for over 30 years he was assistant rector at Trinity Church and vicar of the army post at Governor's Island.

While in New York Rev. Mr. Goodwin became one of the best-known and most popular of Episcopal clergymen, and his services as vicar were looked upon as their constant adviser and friend.

Mr. Goodwin was born in Frederick, Md. After his preliminary education in his home town he entered Old St. Mary's College, Baltimore, and after his graduation he entered the General Theological Seminary, New York, and was ordained more than a half century ago. His first charge was at Ascension Episcopal Church, this city. It was while here that Mr. Goodwin married Miss Mary Van Bibber, a native of this city, and the families of Maryland, afterward he went to Calvert county and then to Chestertown, filling charges with success in both places. His success led to his call to Trinity Church, New York, and his appointment as vicar of Governor's Island.

Besides his widow, Rev. Mr. Goodwin is survived by four sons, Edward Goodwin, of Sacramento, Cal.; Dallas and Frederick Goodwin, of New York, and Paul Goodwin, of Glyndon, and two daughters, Misses Mary Verena and Betty C. Goodwin, of Glyndon.
