Mr. Baltzer of Manchester, who looked after the financial affairs of the dead man, was notified of his sudden demise, and he brought an undertaker to the place, who took charge of the remains and arranged for burial. Grace owned the place on which he lived, and though not poverty stricken, was to a certain extent, taken care of by his neighbors, who frequently supplied him with food. He was 67 years of age. The cause of his death is unknown. He leaves one sister, who resides at Gettysburg.
