

GOOD GRANGE PLATFORM.

In Which is Outlined the Grange Attitude in Affairs of Today.

In his annual address on the work of the year, State Master Charles M. Gardner, of Massachusetts, at the annual state session in Worcester, outlined a "Grange Platform" which is applicable to other states as to Massachusetts, and which summarizes in a particularly concise and instructive way the grange attitude in today's affairs. It was as follows:

1. That we shall recognize the great present need of agriculture for encouragement and shall endeavor to meet that need by every means within the power of this great far-reaching organization; by legislation, by appropriation, by education, by co-operation; to the end that the farmers themselves may realize a better realization of the dignity and honor of their calling may be brought, and to all other classes a new appreciation of how vitally essential to the very existence of life is a growing and prosperous agriculture.

CURRENT NEWS.

FROM HERE, THERE AND EVERYWHERE.

The War Department has ordered five new aeroplanes.

"Votes for women" was rejected in the Virginia Assembly, 85 to 12.

The Government is conducting a criminal prosecution against the "Tathtub Trust" in Detroit.

Maryland markets may be well supplied with home-raised venison in the near future if the bill sent to the Legislature to provide for the raising and selling of deer from private preserves should become a law.

The telegraph and cable companies are finding out that they can make more money at low rates than at high rates. So they are fast reducing their rates. Last week the cable rate from England to South Africa was cut from 18 cents to 7 cents per word.

Russia has asked Germany, Austria, France and England to join with her in bringing about peace between Italy and Turkey. Russia explains that she fears if the war continues much longer it will spread in the Balkan countries, which lie between Turkey and Italy.

Joseph Lister, called the "father of modern surgery," because of an antiseptic system of treatment in surgery, is dead. He first found a way in 1860 to kill the germs which, causing gangrene, almost invariably caused the operation to end fatally. Bloodless amputation and the wiring of fractured bones also increased his fame as a surgeon.

The largest and finest candle ever made, it is said will be blessed by the Pope on Easter morning before the altar of St. Biagio, in St. Peter's Cathedral, Rome. It is expected to burn continually for six years. Costing \$950 this wonderful candle will be decorated almost its whole length in gold leaf by an artist. It is an offering to the patron saint of all who suffer from diseases of the throat from one who was cured of a long illness.

The disease which is killing chestnut trees is the subject of a farmers' bulletin just issued by the Department of Agriculture. Those interested may obtain copies of the bulletin by writing to the Bureau of Plant Industry, Washington, D. C. The disease has already killed almost all the chestnut trees in the vicinity of New York city and is spreading in all directions. It is caused by a fungus which was probably imported from Japan with the Japanese chestnut.

Thomas A. Edison, the inventor, was 65 years old on Sunday of this week. He says he feels as young as he did 25 years ago; and can run up six flights of stairs without stopping for breath, and has not had even a cold in 15 years. His remarkable vigor, he thinks is due to the fact that he eats very little and does not sleep more than four hours in twenty-four. He retires at midnight and up and at work at 4.30 a. m. "People eat too much and sleep too much, and that hurts their health," said Mr. Edison.

His father, grandfather and great-grandfather had the same belief about eating. Their ages at death were 94, 103 and 102 years. All of the inventor's seven uncles on his father's side lived according to the Edison rule of eating little, and all lived to be over 90 years of age.

CHINESE FAMINE.

Pitiful Stories of Starvation—Novel Plans for Relief.

It will doubtless surprise Americans to learn that in many of the interior cities of China are civic improvement associations whose objects are similar to those of such organizations in this country. The most enlightened and public spirited Chinese are banded together in these associations with the purpose of promoting education, sanitation, and other forms of political corruption. All of which sounds familiar to American ears.

For the first time these organizations of the Chinese "best people" are to be actively engaged in carrying out the famine relief measures planned by the relief committee at Shanghai. This is of especial interest in the United States because the relief funds now being raised by the Red Cross will be distributed through the Shanghai Committee. The famine relief fund will be largely used in employing the famine sufferers to reconstruct their own dykes and roads which have been destroyed by floods. Thus the idle and despairing people will be enabled to earn a living while waiting for another harvest and at the same time be helping to restore their country to normal conditions. One of the most serious problems in relief operations attending other famines has been the pauperizing effort upon the population of receiving support during prolonged periods of idleness. The plan now to be adopted promises to reduce this demoralizing result. Mr. C. D. Jamerson, the American Red Cross engineer who has recently traveled extensively through the districts which have suffered from the famine in late years, reports that the people, finding crops usually a failure and relief certain, show a natural inclination to abandon their lands and turn to beggary. This tendency it is hoped now to check by means of a system of relief based upon honest work.

The present unsettled political conditions in China make it impossible for the Chinese Government to contribute liberally to the relief funds. For this reason it becomes the more imperative that the United States, always China's friend, shall respond to the need generously. Famine conditions are so desperate that any description of them seems almost incredible. Mr. Jamerson writes of processions of gaunt, starving people wandering aimlessly along the roads, falling and dying in the mud when they can go no further. Day after day he passes dead bodies of men, women and children lying where they had fallen. And the famine must continue until summer before new crops can be harvested. Nearly 3,000,000 persons live in these famine districts, which cover thousands of square miles.

The Shanghai Relief Committee has asked the United States to raise a relief fund of \$1,000,000 and the American Red Cross is endeavoring to do all possible to meet the need. Contributions for this purpose sent to the officers of Red Cross Chapters or State Boards will be forwarded to China without any delays.

New Book On The White Slave Traffic.

Dr. O. Edward Janney, Chairman of the National Vigilance Committee, has written a book, which has just been published, entitled "The White Slave Traffic in America," dealing with his subject in a sane, accurate and interesting manner.

There are thousands of parents, teachers and other persons having charge of young people, who are unaware of the dangers that threaten young women through the adroit agents of this traffic. There are also many others who if they knew to be actively engaged in carrying out the moral and financial support to a movement to prevent the moral and economic loss which the country now sustains through the operations of the white slave trafficker.
