Hon. Harry M. Claiborn, chief justice of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, formerly of this city, will make the address at the exercises on Commencement day, at Pennsylvania College, Gettysburg.

Mr. Frederick W. Wilcox, who conducts a bakery at 2223 Pennsylvania avenue, Baltimore, was severely cut on the head and arms by flying glass and metal when the bakeoven exploded last Friday morning. Mr. Wilcox, several years ago conducted the Alkibion Hotel, this city.

Rev. L. Emory Bennett, pastor of Centenary Methodist Episcopal Church, attended the funeral of his sister, Annie Belle Bennett, on Monday, at Mt. Washington. She was for many years organist of the Methodist Episcopal Church of Mt. Washington and was a prominent charity worker.

An interesting Symposium "More Men for the Ministry" was held yesterday at Westminster Theological Seminary. Among the speakers were Mr. Daniel Baker, and Dr. J. W. Kirk, of Baltimore; Dr. T. H. Lewis, Dr. J. W. Hering, Dr. D. L. Greenfield, Dr. C. E. Forlines, Dr. C. C. Douglas, Dr. H. L. Freeman and Dr. H. L. Eldredge, of this city.

In the current issue of Leslie's Weekly, which is a special Panama Canal number, the feature is a series of photographs taken on the spot of the canal and its construction and defense by Mrs. C. R. Miller, of this city. Miss Sadie Kneller, of this city, who has secured what are probably the most interesting and illuminating pictures ever taken of this stupendous work.

In the previous issue Mrs. Miller had a number of pictures taken on board the "Belmont" of Maine, just as the ship was being floated.

This week several ladies visited the domestic science room, which is under the supervision of Miss Maud Manahan, at the High School, and watched the class prepare and fry oysters, after which the ladies ate some of the oysters and pronounced them to be delicious. Miss Manahan has two separate classes of ten girls each, who are learning practical lessons in domestic science. The ladies also visited the manual training department of Mr. E. A. Hildey, and the commercial department of Mr. R. Blocher, and were very much impressed by the excellent work being done at the High School.

Beginning July first a new baggage checking system will be in force on the Western Maryland Railway which will mean much to those who do any considerable amount of traveling. Trunks, in addition to coming within a certain weight limit, will also have to be under a certain size, over which excess will be charged. A number of other changes are to be put in force, among them a change for a valuation over \$100 on a piece of baggage. Storage charges will be strictly limited. A change will be made for checking bicycles and other regulations of the Trunk Line Association of which the Western Maryland is now a member will be put in force.

Harrison Shipley, one of the best-known men of Woolery's district, was thrown from a horse and home at Gamber last Sunday evening. His head struck a telephone pole and his skull was fractured. He is in a critical condition, and was taken to the Maryland General Hospital Monday by Dr. R. P. Wells, the attending physician. Mr. Shipley will probably be operated on next week, and upon the operation depends the man's sight. It is thought that the blow killed one of the nerves leading to the eye. A part of the skull will have to be trephined in order to reach the affected nerves. After his arrival at the hospital he suffered several hemorrhages of the brain, and lost consciousness several times.

The fires of Odd Fellowship are burning most bright in this city. The lodge has just remodeled its hall at a cost of \$8,500, and now can boast of one of the finest temples in the State. The building will be rededicated with a three-day celebration on May 10, 11 and 12, starting with a parade on May 10, with the Patriarchs Militant, under Col. George W. Godman, in command, acting as escort. All the lodges in District No. 1 will have late classes and the degrees will be conferred by different staffs. The occasion will also be a reunion of all the lodges in Carroll county and District No. 7, as well as the anniversary celebration of Salem Lodge, which will close Tuesday, May 22, by a big public meeting in the opera house.
