The Western Maryland Railway Company has let a number of contracts this week for improvements to the railway. Paul Case, contractor, is among the successful bidders. He secured the grading and bridge building for a new switch to be run from Westminster to the Coal chute, starting at the factory of the Farmers' Fertilizer and Feed Company, also grading for an extension on the switch starting at the Ice Plant to be run to a point where the old ore bank switch was located on Mr. Theodore F. Englar's farm. Mr. Case also received a contract to build two new stations on the B. & H. Division: one at Brodbeck's and the other at McKinston. The work on the grading commenced yesterday, and the stations are also in process of erection.
