MAY TERM OF COURT OPENED MONDAY WITH SMALL DOCKET.

Grand Jury in Session, But Will Be Discharged Today—Visited Jail Yesterday.

Circuit Court.

The May term of the Circuit Court for Carroll county began Monday morning with Chief Judge Thomas on the bench. Judge Thomas appointed Thomas W. Kelly, of Myers district, bailiff to the grand jury; George S. Berry, bailiff to the petit jury, and Edward M. Stuller, of Hampstead district, and August E. Wittie, of Westminster district, bailiffs at the gates, and Peter Buchman, of Hampstead district, foreman of the grand jury.

The term will be the shortest May term in the history of the county. After the call of the dockets the petit jury was excused until next Monday. The grand jury will remain in session during the week. Not more than three civil cases will be tried and few criminal cases.

Yesterday the grand jury visited the jail and was entertained by sheriff Elias N. Davis. After their departure the Sheriff treated his fourteen prisoners to the surplus of the refreshment provided for the grand jury. The treat consisted of ice cream, cake, bananas and pop, to the delight of the prisoners.

After visiting the Alms House today the grand jury will adjourn. Its report will be published next week.

THE PARADE WAS A BIG SUCCESS IN EVERY WAY.

Sixty Candidates Initiated—Big Audience Witnesses Exhibition Drill of Queen Esther Rebecca Lodge.

The Odd Fellows' parade and celebration, which took place in this city on last Friday, Saturday and Sunday, was a pronounced success from start to finish. Several thousand persons witnessed the parade.

The occasion was the dedication of the temple erected many years ago by Salem Lodge, No. 60, which has been removed and improved at a cost of \$8,500, in connection with which the lodge celebrated the sixty-fourth anniversary of its institution.

The first event of the program was the parade, which started from the railroad at 2:30 p. m., and marched through the principal streets. The parade was formed as follows: Officers John N. Weigle and William Helm; Chief Marshal, James M. Stoner.

After the parade the remodeled temple was rededicated by the grand officers of the Grand Lodge—Grand Master Groom, Deputy Grand Master F. G. Dorey, Grand Warden William J. Arthur, Grand Secretary J. F. Plummer, Grand Chaplain Percy Foster, Grand Marshal William P. Cole, Jr., and Grand Representative S. H. Foxwell.

This was followed with an exhibition drill by the degree team of Queen Esther Rebecca Lodge (ladies) of Baltimore. Not a third of those who desired to witness these ceremonies were able to find room in the opera hall, which is a part of the remodeled temple.

In the evening about 7:30 o'clock an initiation was given to 60 candidates. From 10:30 to 12 p. m., sandwiches and coffee were served free at the Firemen's Building to all members attending the dedication.

On Saturday a festival and bazaar was held at the Firemen's Building for the benefit of Salem Lodge during the day and evening. The supper committee was composed of L. E. Wilmet, Frank Brightwell, John Manning, Henry Cootes, who extend their hearty thanks to the ladies who generously assisted in making the festival a success.

Another feature of the day was a ball game on Athletic field between Trenton High School and Westminster High School, in which the former was defeated 10 to 1.

The celebration closed on Sunday, afternoon, by holding a public meeting in the Opera Hall at which an address on Old Fellowship was delivered by Rev. Martin L. Neal, of Bethany Lodge, No. 22, Gen. Arm. Md.

Dr. Joshua W. Hering, a prominent member of the order, was master of ceremonies, and, in opening the exercises, alloted briefly, about the demonstration which occurred at the original dedication of the temple in 1859, which he witnessed.

Rev. Mr. Beall's lecture was a statement of what Odd Fellowship stands for and an explanation of the principles upon which it is founded. He made it clear that to be an Odd Fellow, living up to the standards of the order, was to be a good man, a good citizen, a good son, husband and father.

FIRE AT TORPEDO FACTORY.

Explosion Occurs—Employee Is Burned—Building Withstands Fire.

While a strong wind was blowing Monday afternoon, about 1:30 o'clock, an explosion in the mixing room of George B. Jackson's torpedo factory started a fire which was confined by the fire department to the rooms in which it originated.

Material that was being handled by hands and burned his arms, severely. It set fire to his clothing and he rushed outside, where another employee dashed a bucket of water over him, quenching the flames.

The loss on the building and material will not exceed \$100, and was insured.

The factory, which employs 30 or 40 hands, has been in operation several years. The building was burned down on the morning of January 10th, last, when the fire started from an explosion at the stove. In rebuilding it was made fire resisting. This saved it from total destruction on Monday.
