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## PREPARING FOR GRANGE FAIR

Will Be Held From August 13 to 16 Near Taneytown.

People are beginning to take a lively interest in the fifteenth annual fair to be held by the Maryland State Grange in Oiler's Grove, August 13, 14, 15 and 16, under the auspices of Taneytown Grange, No. 184. The officers of the fair are: E. O. Garner, president; William K. Eckert, vice-president; Milton Ohler, second vice-president; E. P. Myers, treasurer; Charles E. H. Shriner, secretary.

The big show will begin with an address of welcome by Hon. J. A. Goulden, of New York. Rev. Seth Russell Downie will respond. This will be followed by addresses by Judge Harry M. Clabaugh, chief justice of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia; Roy N. Waite, associate-poultryman, Maryland Agricultural Station, and Francis Neal Parke, of Westminster.

On August 14, Hon. David J. Lewis, of Cumberland will speak on Maryland Land and Possibilities of Western Maryland; Hon. W. M. Hays, assistant secretary of agriculture; D. Fred Shamberger, secretary of the State Land Good Roads Association, on the Farmer's Boy; H. M. Stokes, of Hanover, Pa., on Profitable Dairying; J. D. Brooks, of Westminster; M. E. Walsh, lecturer of the Carroll County Pomona Grange.

On August 15 addresses will be delivered by the following: Dr. Richard S. Hill, director of Maryland Farmers' Institutes, College Park; Governor Goldsborough; Hon. W. O. Scar Collier, Easton, Md., Corn Breeding; Hon. J. Fred C. T. Abbott; William G. Smyth, lecturer of Maryland State Grange; J. Collin Vincent, Chamber of Commerce, Baltimore, Co-operation. He will also show samples of grain.

Addresses will be delivered on August 16 by Prof. H. J. Patterson, master of the State Grange; Prof. N. Schmitz, agronomist at the Maryland Agricultural Experiment Station, who will talk to the boys Corn Club and Hon. J. A. Goulden and Rev. Seth Russell Downie.

There will be pigeon and poultry shows, exhibitions of jellies, preserves and canned fruit; a corn and grain exhibit; a horse and mule show and a midway.

By brilliant fielding and batting at opportune moments Westminster defeated Manchester 4 to 3, Saturday afternoon on Athletic Field. Through the home team's playing in the first three innings was ragged, by good baserunning and timely hitting it was able to overcome the visitors' three-run lead and nose out a victory in the seventh. C. Arnold played the most sensational game seen on the new field, accepting six difficult chances. He was also lightning on bases, pilfering two bags and coming home from second on a short hit to left. Cook again used the stick at the right time, driving in the winning run. J. Smith's work at third was wonderful. Sullivan excelled for the visitors, taking four hard balls in center without a slipup. The game ended with a fast double play. Arnold, Gehr and Cook figuring.
