BUCKEY ESTATE DIVIDED.

Approximated \$6000,000. Most of Which Was Given 20 Nephews and Nieces.

The estate of the late George P. Buckey, of Union Bridge, which was closed this week in the Orphans' Court of this county, was probably the largest ever adjudicated by that tribunal.

The special bequests included \$5,000 each to a brother and sister of the testator and \$1000 a watch and chain for his nephew and namesake, George P. Buckey, Jr.

The residue of the estate, amounting to \$313,593.12 net, was equally divided between the 18 nephews and nieces of the testator. Mr. Buckey had twice before his death given his nephews and nieces, then numbering 20, \$5,000 each, an aggregate of \$200,000.

The tax on the executors' commissions was \$821.92, and the collateral inheritance tax, \$16,184.65. These taxes and commissions, with the amounts distributed to the devisees under the will and the sums previously given by Mr. Buckey to his nephews and nieces, made up an estate approximating \$600,000.

728 TICKETS PLEDGED.

WESTMINSTER WILL HAVE CHAUTAUQUA IN 1913.

At the afternoon session of the Chautauqua on Friday Dr. Turner, the platform manager, presented the matter of Chautauqua for Westminister in 1913, and asked for an expression of opinion as to whether the people desired it next year.

Quite a number of citizens spoke and were unanimous in their praise of the program given by the association this year and the desirability of securing the Chautauqua next year. Dr. Turner then asked for a pledge of tickets, stating that a number of tickets necessary to enable the association to sign a contract for 1913, was seven hundred. Four hundred and forty pledges were quickly secured and at the evening session, pledges for the remainder were handed in, and thereby a week of delightful entertainment is assured for next year.

At the close of the evening program Dr. Turner asked those who had pledged tickets to remain for the purpose of selecting a committee to authorize the signing of the contract and co-operate with the association in making the Chautauqua a success next year. H. P. Gorsuch was chosen chairman, and among the Pastors of the churches in the city were each requested to name two members of the committee, and the Pastors themselves be members ex-officio. The committee has since been supplemented by appointment of a number of additional members from the city and county and consists of the following persons:

The committee met on Monday evening and completed the organization by the election of Prof. Daniel as secretary and Nathaniel Baumgartner as treasurer, and authorized the chairman and secretary to sign the contract on condition that the association would agree to a slight modification of one of the provisions.

The following letter was received by the chairman of the local committee from Dr. Pearson, director of the Chautauqua:

Swathmore, Pa., Sept. 9, 1912.
My dear Mr. Gorsuch:
I am greatly pleased with the outcome of the Chautauqua at Westminister. We went to Westminister under most discouraging circumstances. You know all about the conditions so I need not remind you. We expected that we were to lose money. In that we have not been disappointed, but we hoped to prove to Westminister just what Chautauqua is, so that for the future we could expect to pay expenses.

We have been more than justified in our judgment of Westminister. It seemed to us an ideal Chautauqua town. If that had not been the case we should not have the excellent prospects which we now have for next year.

Personally I am very grateful to your committee and others of your city who so valiantly fought our fight for us, you have so quickly caught our vision and have given us your name and most of all your influence.

Of course, you understand as some of the others do not that it is, and must be a co-operative plan. We cannot hope to succeed without the confidence of the community, and without the sincere co-operation of the community. On the other hand a Chautauqua is not possible for most of the towns except through some such plan as we are operating. The expense of putting on an independent Chautauqua, providing the same program which we have presented, with tent rental, and other expenses, would amount to about three thousand dollars.

Mr. Turner writes me that you are to organize your committee and send in the contract this week. I am pleased.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.

WAS HELD NEAR WINFIELD—REPORT SHOWS GREAT PROGRESS DURING THE YEAR.

The fifth annual convention and reunion of the Carroll County Sunday School Association was held Thursday, September 5th, in the beautiful picnic grove near Winfield, Franklin district. While the morning was cloudy and threatened rain, the clouds disappeared at noon, which brought out a large crowd in the afternoon.

The music was under the leadership of Mr. C. W. Barnes and Prof. R. J. Brandenburg, supplemented by Miss Freva L. Yeiser, organist; Harry N. Grotz, cornet; Wm. E. Frock, trombone, and Charles Leppo, clarinet.

Sunday school workers were present from all parts of the county. The morning program consisted of reports from the several district associations, by the presidents and secretaries, three out of the four having been present: Guy L. Fowler and Miss Myrtle Caple, second district; Dr. M. M. Norris and Miss Edna Buckley, third district; and Prof. J. Brandenburg and E. A. Shoemaker, fourth district.

Short addresses were made by Rev. Tozer and Rev. Martin Schweitzer, emphasizing the importance of more progressive work in the Sunday school, and address, "The Evils of the Licensed Saloon" by Rev. W. D. King, Mt. Airy, which was forcible, instructive and highly appreciated conducted the morning session of the convention.

In the afternoon Elder J. Walter Englar, New Windsor, led devotional, while Rev. Henry C. Hall, of Taylorsville, led the devotional in the morning. These services were ably conducted, reflecting the spirit of a Bible school service.

The county president gave a short talk on "Our part in the work" which consisted in part, "That the mission of the county and district associations was two fold: To create greater interest in Bible study in our schools through co-operative work, and to assist the Maryland and International Sunday School Associations in their efforts to evangelize the world through the child, which movement is world wide.

Miss Ada L. Trump, county secretary, gave a glowing report of the county for the convention year, which shows marked interest, and progress along all lines. The county is organized into four district associations, all of which are well officered, and conventions and rallies were held in each of the districts.

Financially, the association is also meeting her obligations. She paid annually during the last year \$100 for the extension of the work, and as 29 schools have already contributed this year, and many have not yet contributed that the association will again pay her pledge.

The report gave in details the receipts and expenditures of the year which was unanimously adopted.

Rev. W. H. Hetrick, pastor of the Lutheran Church, Westminister, spoke on the "Men in the Sunday School." He said in part, "Christ was a man by a man," and then took up the convention theme: "The Evangelization of the World Through the Child," making a strong appeal for co-operation in the work. The address was powerful and greatly enjoyed by the large audience.

Rev. B. W. Kindley, General Secretary Maryland Sunday School Association, presented his report and election in a few well chosen words invited the Sunday school workers of the county to the State convention at Frederick, and congratulated the Carroll County Sunday School Association upon being so well organized, and said she would receive the best banner at the state convention ever given, for efficient work.

Rev. Martin Schweitzer, of Union Bridge, chairman of the nominating committee presented his report and also presided while the convention elected the following officers for the ensuing year: G. W. Yeiser, President; George Mather, vice-president; Miss Adda L. Trump, secretary-treasurer; Jesse F. Garner, superintendent teacher training; Mrs. F. D. Dieffenbach, superintendent Home Department and Visitation; Rev. W. H. Hetrick, superintendent Adult Organized Work; H. F. Leese, Superintendent Home Daily Bible Readings; also the following executive committee: Rev. Martin Schweitzer, Atlee Wampler, Rev. D. L. Greenfield, Rev. S. F. Casen, George H. Birnie, Rev. J. E. Bennett and Rev. Henry C. Hall.

Bishop Rudolph Dubs, D. D. LL. D., of Harrisburg, was then introduced who spoke for more than one hour. Bishop Dubs is a theological student, and orator of national fame, and to attempt to give even in part the great oration would mean failure. The address was highly appreciated, and the audience gave close attention throughout.

The second district association comprising Woolery, Westminister and New Windsor, extended invitation to hold the next convention within her limits, the first Thursday of September, being September 4th, 1913, which was accepted by the Executive Committee.

Offering, Doxology and Benediction closed the 5th annual convention and reunion of Sunday school workers.


There are Many Others Like Her.
