

WILSON VIA LAFOLLETTE.

Spreckels Comes Out Strongly For Jerseyman in Magazine—Wisconsinite Expected to Release His Friends to Vote For Democratic Candidate.

Washington, Aug. 30.—Senator La Follette, leader of all the Republican progressives in Congress, may not be openly supporting Governor Wilson for the Presidency, but he is lending his magazine to that support. He is allowing appeals to his friends in Wilson's behalf through the medium of his publication.

In the last issue of the La Follette Weekly Lamp, the editor, the millionaire reformer of San Francisco, and one of the pioneer followers of LaFollette, urging all progressives to rally to the support of Governor Wilson. The Californian says the Democratic nominee is the only genuine progressive in the race for the Presidency.

Says Taft is Out of Question

After showing why President Taft and Colonel Roosevelt are in league with special privilege, the editor explains why Governor Wilson is not controlled or remotely influenced by the interests. President Taft, Mr. Spreckels says, is out of the question from the standpoint of progressive, thinking people, whereas Colonel Roosevelt is only a progressive because it is to his advantage to be one at this time.

Of Governor Wilson Spreckels says: "Special privilege interests will not support Wilson. They prefer either Taft or Roosevelt, for these interests were permitted to grow more powerful in all matters during the administrations of both Taft and Roosevelt. Four more years of either would no doubt result in legislation making legal the watered stocks and bonds of the great trusts, and the exploitation of the masses would continue.

"An Awful Burden on the People." "Special privilege greed has placed an awful burden upon the American people during the administration of both Taft and Roosevelt. Both of these men have had an opportunity to correct these wrongs, but have not done so. The evils must be stamped out by the voters by selecting someone other than Taft or Roosevelt at the coming election, or more serious methods for the elimination of the influence of predatory wealth will follow.

"I feel justified in bringing these facts to the attention of the people, feeling satisfied that if they investigate carefully, in the place of being stampeded by mere noise or by the cheap promises of designing politicians, they will decide as I have—that Governor Wilson alone deserves their support at the coming election."

Shows Trend of Vote.

The announcement of Mr. Spreckels that he will support Governor Wilson, coupled with the visit and announcement to the same effect of Louis Brandeis, of Boston, the other day, shows which way the La Follette people mean to vote in the coming election. Both Spreckels and Brandeis were originally La Follette supporters. They aided in every possible way the movement to nominate the Wisconsin Senator and were large contributors to the La Follette campaign fund.

The statements made by these men and the other signs that have come from the LaFollette camp show the feeling of the Senator's friends. The Senator may not come out for Wilson and is not really expected to do so, but he will lend moral support to the Democratic candidate and will release his friends to Wilson when the time comes. That much can be calculated upon, even at this stage of the campaign.

The State Forester, F. W. Besley, is visiting each county in the State this fall for the purpose of making woodlot and timberland examinations and giving advice in handling such lands when requested to do so. Advice is likewise given in the matter of forest tree planting. This occasion will afford the land owner the opportunity of having his woodlands examined by an expert, without charge and a plan of management proposed to fit as nearly as possible the needs of the individual case. The examination is made for the benefit of the land owner, the State receiving an indirect benefit in stimulating practical forestry by means of such object lessons to show what applied forestry really means, and what it will accomplish. It is the aim of forestry to take woodland conditions as they are on the farms, differing widely as they do, and by suggesting such methods as experience has proven adaptable to aid in securing their highest productivity. There is no matter in what condition the woodland may be, whether mature and ready to cut, whether cut-over, crippled or burned or full of promising young growth, much can be done to secure a valuable second growth or to improve its present condition, such things as cost little or nothing but which will greatly increase the final yield.






