COUNTY CENTRAL COMMITTEE MEETS.

RESOLUTION ADOPTED AS TO DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN FUND.

The Democratic Central Committee for Carroll county held its first meeting on Monday, September 23, at the Democratic Advocate Office, Westminster, Md. There was a large attendance of the committeemen from every district in the county and much enthusiasm expressed as to the outcome of the coming campaign.

The following resolution is an abstract from the minutes of the meeting as adopted by the committee:

"Resolved that the Central Committee for each district in the county, acting as agent for T. H. Shriver, Treasurer, proceed to receive popular subscriptions of One Dollar and under for the Wilson, Marshall and Talbot campaign and turn same over to the Treasurer of the County Central Committee, Mr. T. H. Shriver, who will be the agent for the county expenses and then to Blair Lee, Treasurer of the Auxiliary Committee, of Maryland.

"Resolved that Guy W. Steele, Esq., of Westminster, Md., act as attorney for the County Central Committee and the Democratic Registrars for Carroll county during the coming campaign."

Mr. Steele will be glad to give his opinion upon any legal question which the Central Committee or Democratic Registrars wish to be advised upon during the campaign whether written to or called at his office by telephone, Westminster, Md.

The above resolution is in entire accord with the sentiment in many counties and states throughout the nation, as is shown by the following extract from the Baltimore Sun of today:

"It is already evident that the Wilson campaign fund is going to be different from all other Presidential campaign funds ever collected in the United States. The first announcement, made on September 10, showed that the numerous subscription funds being raised by individuals and newspapers in various parts of the country emphasize the fact. These subscriptions are practically all for small amounts. The Columbia (S. C.) State has raised more than \$5,000, in sums ranging from 10 cents to \$5. Similar funds are being raised in various other Southern States, the especial point about them being that not a cent is required to carry those particular States for Wilson. The money is being contributed out of pure devotion to Democratic principles and will be sent to the national organization for distribution in other parts of the country.

"Now this is a splendid spirit and a revolutionary thing. Not a President in the memory of the present generation, but has been elected partly through the help of money doled out by corporations whose interests might or might not conflict with the interests of the people. Every President so elected has been in a position where any day he might be called on to take a stand which would prove him ungrateful either to the people or to the special interests which had befriended him. Wilson will be the first President in years absolutely free from such obligations.

But a campaign fund so raised will be of sufficient size only if every man who favors Wilson's nomination contributes to the extent of his ability. In Maryland, because of the provisions of the corrupt practices act, such contributions can be made only through one or another of the properly appointed treasurers. The treasurer of the Democratic Auxiliary Committee, whose advertisement asking for contributions has appeared in 'The Sun,' one of these. His appeal ought to meet with a ready and overwhelming response."

DEMOCRATIC CLUB ORGANIZED IN MT. AIRY.

100 ENTHUSIASTIC DEMOCRATS ADOPT CHARTER AND ELECT OFFICERS.

An enthusiastic meeting of Democrats was held in Runkles Hall in Mt. Airy last Thursday night for the purpose of organizing a Wilson, Marshall and Talbot Club. About one hundred Democrats were present. The meeting was called to order by Dr. William D. Hopkins who acted as temporary chairman. The following rules and charter were adopted:

Believing that in the true Democratic principles as laid down by Jefferson, the basis of Government by a free people, and that organized effort is necessary among those who are in sympathy with and desire Democratic success, in the hope and under the belief that thorough organization will insure the success of Wilson, Marshall and Talbot in next November, and that in order that orderly work may be done we adopt the following articles for our guidance.

Article I. The names of this organization shall be the Wilson, Marshall and Talbot Club of Mount Airy District, Carroll County." Its object is to aid in giving them a majority of the votes cast at the election to be held in November next.

Article II. The elective officers of this organization shall consist of a President, ten Vice-Presidents, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Sergeant at Arms, and an Executive Committee of four members.

Article III. These regular meetings of this committee shall perform the duties which usually fall upon like officers and a similar committee in other organizations, and they shall hold office until after the election and the abandonment of the Democratic ticket.

Article IV. The President and Secretary shall be ex-officio members of all committees.

Article V. The President shall appoint all committees (each of which shall consist of three or more members) that in his judgment are necessary or will be of aid in the work of the Club, and is directed to appoint the following committees, designating the chairman of each: Finance Committee, Membership Committee, Registration and Polling Committee, Speakers Committee, Music, Decoration and Marching Committee, First Voters Committee.

Article VI. The regular meetings of this organization shall be held on each Saturday night during the campaign; special meetings may be called by the president at any time, or in his absence by the Executive Committee.

Article VII.—Sec. 1. Any one is qualified to be a member of this club, who is known to be a Democrat; or any one in sympathy with the objects of this organization and who intends supporting the Democratic ticket. The fall shall also be eligible to membership.

Article VIII. In order to become a member of this organization the applicant for membership must sign the membership roll or authorize the Secretary to substitute his name thereon.

The following account of the death and funeral of Mrs. E. B. Taylor, wife of the Rev. Mr. Taylor, who was formerly rector of Ascension Church, this city, appears in the Hartford Daily Courant of September 17. It was sent to The Advocate but was not received in time for publication last week, although a short account of Mrs. Taylor's death appeared in our issue of last week.
